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Argentina

Mendoza is the main winemaking area of Argentina with more than 160 000 hectares of vineyards. More than 80% of all Argentinian wines are produced is this province and it has become a centre of reference for the Argentinian and South American wine industry. Mendoza is made up of five large winemaking regions: North, East, Centre, South and Uco Valley (Valle de Uco). Each region has a very different terroir, each with its own altitude and soil characteristics. These terroirs, coupled with Mendoza's long, dry and mild autumn, enable wine producers and oenologists to harvest according to their preferred level of grape ripeness, without being restricted by the weather.

Argentina

Valle de Uco: A viticultural region southwest of Mendoza, in Argentina. Situated along the Tunuyán River, the Uco Valley is widely considered one of the top wine regions in Mendoza, and all of Argentina. The annual average temperature is 14 °C (57 °F) and altitudes range from 900-1,200 metres (3,000-3,900 ft) above sea level. The combination of high elevation, alluvial soils, irrigation sourced from the Andes Mountains, a long growing season with over 250 sunny days a year, little rain and vast temperature differences between day and night are all conducive to growing quality wine grapes. These climate and geography elements come together to provide excellent fruit ripen-



ing and concentration, developing colors, aromas, flavors and textures resulting in wines that are deep in color, intense in aromas and rich in flavors. Traditionally, the varietals grown in this area are Sémillon and Malbec; together with Bonarda and Barbera in a smaller amount.

Albaflor Malbec Valle de Uco Rich red color on appearance with an aroma of ripe dark fruits and hints of violets. The mouthfeel is concentrated with cherry notes and spices. The wine has a long finish with mature, seductive tannins.

Australia

The Australian wine industry is one of the world's largest exporters of wine. Wine is produced in every state, with more than 60 designated wine regions totaling approximately 160,000 hectares; however Australia's wine regions are mainly in the southern, cooler parts of the country, with vineyards located in South Australia, New South Wales, Victoria, Western Australia, Tasmania and Queensland. The wine regions in each of these states produce different wine varieties and styles that take advantage of the particular Terroir. The major varieties are predominantly Shiraz, Cabernet Sauvignon, Chardonnay, Merlot, Semillon, Pinot noir, Riesling, and Sauvignon blanc. Wines are often la-



belled with the name of their grape variety, which must constitute at least 85 percent of the wine.

McLaren Vale is a wine region in the Australian state of South Australia located in the Adelaide metropolitan area and centred on the town of McLaren Vale about 38 kilometres (24 mi) south of the Adelaide city centre. It is internationally renowned for the wines it produces and included within the Great Wine Capitals of the World. The McLaren Vale wine region is well known for its dry red wines, especially those made from Shiraz, Grenache and Mourvedre. Cabernet Sauvignon, Tempranillo and angiovese are also grown. White wine varieties in the wine region include Fiano, Vermentino, Grenache blanc, Roussanne and other such Mediterranean varieties.



d'Ardenberg, The Originals, Shiraz The Footbolt McLaren Vale
(Footbolt is named after one of the families 'thoroughbreds) A consistently
great McLaren Vale Shiraz. Aromas of ripe blackberry and spice that mingle with minty peppery notes. Generously rich with amazing fruit weight and balanced, chewy tannins. Coonawarra wine region is a wine region centred on the town of Coonawarra in the Limestone Coast zone of South Australia. It is known for the Cabernet Sauvignon wines produced on its "terra rossa" soil.

This wine shows oodles of bright cherry, clove, and star anise, with a soft floral note and a hint of reduction. The palate is medium in weight, but with a feathery quality to the fruit, raspy tannins, and a powdery texture. At the close, it shows a lovely, long finish that tastes like Chinese Five spice. Layered, likable and full of personality, this makes for fun, youthful drinking now, but should age until 2030 at least.

Austria

Kamptal DAC: On the steep terraces that crowd the southern slope of the hillside – so steep that no permanent covering of loess could remain – it is mainly Riesling vines that root deeply, producing powerful, mineral-driven and (above all) extremely long-lived wines. Toward the Danube, the soil formations of the vineyards changes; here, refreshing and classic but also very robust wines from Grüner Veltliner find ideal conditions on the broad loess and loam terraces. The classic Kamptal DAC on the Gebietswein and Ortswein levels manifests itself in both Grüner Veltliner and Riesling as a fresh, dry white wine with personality; pleasantly light on its feet and yet exhibiting concentrated structure. The great robust Riedenweine and Reserve wines are, with their rich character and appreciable depth, are unmistakable expressions of their origins. In addition, white and red wines of the Pinot family as well as the Blauer Zweigelt show their finer aspects here, marketed



under the designation "Niederösterreich". In terms of climate, the dynamic tension that arises in the Kamptal between the hot, Pannonian basin in the east and the cool Waldviertel to the northwest is quite noticeable, and this fresh breath can also be felt in the wines. Interplay between the heat of the day and the substantially lower nighttime temperatures imparts great aromatic finesse and lively acidity to the grapes.

Grüner Veltliner, Franz Etz, Austria, Kamptal (Niederűsterreich) Region, (1 liter) A lively, densely fruited white wine from the of Austria. Known as the ultimate food wine for its great minerality & appealing freshness.

Neusiedlersee Burgenland DAC: Austria's winegrowing region Neusiedlersee, situated to the east of Lake Neusiedl, reaches from the hills and the big wine town of Gols over the flat Heideboden down to the melancholy Seewinkel. A great wealth of grape varieties ripen here on the banks of the shallow steppe lake, on 6,675 hectares of vineyards. Since 2012, Neusiedlersee DAC has stood for fruitforward and harmonious red wines vinified from the variety Zweigelt, which are moulded by the climate and the soil, with the supplementary designation "Reserve".

Lychee and mango flavors stand prominently midpalate, while the acidity pierces through, not letting this white become syrupy. There is a sense of grace that marks the long finish. Drink through 2035.

Bulgaria

The main Bulgarian wine regions are the Struma Valley, the Thracian Valley, the Rose Valley, the Black Sea region and the Danubian Plain. Bulgaria is one of the oldest wine producing countries in the world. Wine making appeared under the Thracians, Indo-European tribes, more than 4,000 years ago. There are about 300 wineries in Bulgaria and the number is set to increase every year. The upshot is that Bulgaria has a long history of winemaking, aided by a favorable climate (toasty summers and icy winters), fertile soil, and a culture that is so deeply entrenched with good wine.

Thracian Valley: Red wine grapes are to the fore in the western part of the appellation. Leading varieties include the Bordeaux varieties, Ruby Cabernet, Mavrud and Pamid. Mavrud is very much an indigenous flagship variety for the area. Wine centers in the west include Asenovgrad, Brezovo and Perushtitsa. The zone is very large, and so general comments regarding wine styles and growing conditions are very hard to make. In the west, on the Macedonian border, it includes the outlying region region of the Struma Valley. In the east it encompasses the southern half of the Black Sea region. Between the two sits the central Thracian Lowlands. The west is protected from harsh winds and weather systems from the northeast. The climate is still continental but more moderate than many parts of the Danubian



Plains. There is typically plenty of rainfall throughout the growing season. East Thracia is regarded as the fruit and vegetable center of the country. There are also many vineyards on the fertile soils in areas such as Stara Zagora, Nova Zagora and Korten. Traditionally the emphasis here has also been on red wines. However in recent years Chardonnay, Sauvignon Blanc, Muscat and Traminer have produced good results. The area also shows potential for sparkling wines.

Rough Day, Cabernet Sauvignon Thracian Valley Bulgaria

California: Central Coast

The Central Coast AVA is a large American Viticultural Area in the U.S. state of California that spans from Santa Barbara County in the south to the San Francisco Bay Area in the north. The boundaries of the Central Coast include portions of six counties. With around 100,000 acres (400 km²) planted to wine grapes, Chardonnay accounts for more than half of the total. Within this larger AVA are several smaller appellations that share the same cooling influence from the Pacific Ocean. Because U.S. county names automatically qualify as legal appellations of origin for wine, the following appellations do not require registration with the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau: Contra Costa County, Monterey County, San Luis Obispo County, Santa Barbara County, and Santa Clara County

Sea Sun, Pinot Noir (Fairfield, California)

Now home to more than 200 wineries and 32,000 vineyard acres, it was divided into 11 smaller AVAs in 2014: Adelaida District, Creston District, El Pomar District, Estrella District, Genesco District, Highlands District, San Juan Creek, San Miguel District, Santa Margarita Ranch, Templeton Gap District, and the Willow Creek District.

Santa Maria Valley is an AVA located in the northernmost part of Santa Barbara County, just east of Santa Maria city and 15 miles (24km) inland from the Pacific Coast. It was the first in the county to receive official AVA approval in 1981, and is renowned for producing some of California's finest Pinot Noir and Chardonnay wines — the appellation's two flagship varieties. The east—west orientation of the wide, open valley means cool winds and fog flow in freely from the Pacific Ocean, settling most noticeably in lower-lying areas. This climatic effect is significant in several viticultural areas along California's Pacific coast, as the cool maritime influence lengthens the growing season and contributes to the eventual sugar/acid balance in Santa Maria Valley's wines. Indeed, Santa Maria Valley's extended grape-growing season is among the longest in the world.

Santa Barbara, Central Coast, CA- Burgundian in sensibility but with California style is one way of describing Jim Clendenen's Chardonnays- Structure and restraint melded with bountiful opulence is another. This offers beautiful tropical flavors with a buttery complexity on the finish.

Monterey County, on California's Central Coast, is a relatively new addition to the United States' wine map. It was only in the 1960s that commercial-scale viticulture began to take off here, when the Salinas Valley became the place to plant vines on this stretch of the Californian coastline. The wide array of terroir means that a diverse range of wines are produced in the region, most notably from Pinot Noir, Chardonnay and Cabernet Sauvignon. Monterey County roughly follows the path of the Salinas Valley, which stretches approximately 90 miles (145km) from Monterey Bay to the edge of San Luis Obispo County in the south. The valley is bordered by the Galiban Mountains in the east and the Santa Lucia Mountains which run down the edge of the Pacific Coast. The AVAs in Monterey County can be categorised into three groups: those in the Santa Lucia Mountains, those in the Salinas Valley, and those in the inland Galiban range. The Salinas Valley, through which the Salinas river flows, is the engine room of Monterey County. It is here along the valley floor where most of the AVA's vines are planted (including the sizable single-vineyard San Bernabe AVA). San Lucas, Santa Lucia Highlands and Arroyo Seco can also be found along the path of the river and stretching up into the eastern foothills of the Santa Lucia Mountains.

Arroyo Seco is nestled between Greenfield and Soledad. This appellation includes a wide variety of topography, perfectly positioned against the Santa Lucia Mountains then opening up into a valley. The topography of the AVA is an enabling factor of the variety of microclimates and soil. The mountain range protects the vines in the heart of the valley from the cool Pacific Ocean breeze, while moving east the cool breeze gains access to the valley floor. The soil throughout the valley is also varied; the soil closer to the valley floor is stubborn and forces the vines to dig deep for nutrients. This type of soil and micro-climate create an ideal environment for Rhone and Bordeaux varietals. The



eastern part of the appellation is well-suited to cool-loving varietals, including Chardonnay and Riesling. Chardonnay from Arroyo Seco often shows distinct melon and apricot flavors. Although Arroyo Seco is small in acreage compared to other California AVAs this area has the spirit and strength to take on anything that comes its way.

Stoke's Ghost, Petite Syrah (Monterey, California)

California: Central Coast

Contra Costa County is an AVA directly east of San Francisco Bay in California's Central Coast AVA. Once a prolific wine-growing region, the county is home to some century-old plantings of Zinfandel, Mourvèdre and Carignan that produce rustic, earthy and leathery styles of red wine. The county sits on the edge of the San Francisco and Suisun bays at the entrance to where the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta can be traced back inland towards Lodi. Livermore Valley is directly south of Contra Costa County, and the city of San Francisco across the bay gives the county its name — "contra costa" meaning "opposite shore" in Spanish. Most of the vineyards are in the eastern part of the county, surrounding the towns of Brentwood and Oakley.

The North Coast is an American Viticultural Area in the state of California that encompasses grape-growing regions in six counties located north of San Francisco: Lake, Marin, Mendocino, Napa, Sonoma, and Solano. This large appellation covers over 3,000,000 acres (12,000 km²) and includes a number of smaller sub-appellations that all share the common ecology trait of weather affected by the cool fog and breezes of the Pacific Ocean.

Aromas of raspberry and cola lead to a rich mouthfeel and flavors of black cherry, licorice and subtle oaky vanilla. The finish is long and complex.

North Coast: Lake County

Lake County contains eight distinct AVAs (Benmore Valley, Big Valley District, Clear Lake, Guenoc Valley, High Valley, Kelsey Bench, and Red Hills Lake County), all of which are situated around Clear Lake — California's largest freshwater lake and the oldest lake in North America — and near the base of Mount Konocti volcano. Here, grapes grow in volcanic, mineral-rich soils at high altitudes of 1,370 to 2,600 feet, where mild summers and cool winter temperatures create ideal conditions for producing elegant, complex



wines. While the region has become well-known for its cabernet sauvignon and sauvignon blanc wines, Lake County is also planted to cabernet franc, petit sirah, merlot, syrah, malbec, grenache, zinfandel, viognier, and riesling, among others.

Red Hills: With vineyards starting at 1,350 feet and reaching up to 2,600 feet above sea level, Red Hills of Lake County grapes are grown in mountain climate conditions. Upper level airflows from the Pacific Ocean combine with many local convections to moderate daytime highs. Low relative humidity and varied topography permit quick radiative cooling of ridgetop vineyards in the late afternoon and evenings. Both factors allow for good acid retention during ripening. Cold winters and dry summer conditions are an important factor in Lake County's reduced pesticide and other application rates, one of the lowest in California.

Big Valley District AVA. Big Valley's mix of gravel, clay and loam, bright sunlight from the 1,400 feet elevation, and cool nights produces remarkable Sauvignon Blancs, establishing Lake County as one of the premier California regions for the varietal. Along with the vol-



canic Kelsey Bench, the gravel seams in Big Valley produce intense and balanced Zinfandels and Cabernet Francs.

Mendocino County has a wide range of viticultural mesoclimates that are influenced by the county's diversity in climatic and geography. Following the path of the Navarro River from the Pacific, the fog drifts in and blankets the valley with low hanging cool air. Vineyards in these areas are often planted with cool-climate varieties like Pinot noir, Chardonnay, Gewürztraminer and Riesling. At high elevations in Anderson Valley and nearby Mendocino Ridges beyond the fog's reach, these warmer pockets of lands will usually be planted with more warm climate varieties like Zinfandel. Around Ukiah, in the center of the large Mendocino AVA to the east of the Mendocino Ranges, the climate can get very warm to hot dur-



ing the growing season. The warm allows this part of the county develop full bodied and very ripe red wines from Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Petite Sirah and Zinfandel. The Mendocino Wine Regions include: Anderson Valley, Cole Ranch, Covelo, Dos Rios, Eagle Peak, McDowell Valley, Mendocino, Mendocino County, Mendocino Ridge, North Coast, Potter Valley, Redwood Valley, Talmage Region, Ukiah Valley, and Yorkville Highlands.

Carneros AVA: The official Carneros AVA (created in 1983) covers an area of 90 square miles (230 square km) on the southernmost foothills of the Mayacamas and Sonoma mountain ranges. This location means the AVA is divided between America's two most famous wine-producing regions - the eastern half in Napa, the western half in Sonoma. Besides varietal Pinot Noir and Chardonnay, they also make high-quality sparkling wines from the two varieties. In the 1980s, Champagne house Taittinger chose Carneros as the location for its Californian presence (Domaine Carneros), at around the same time



as Cava magnates Jose and Gloria Ferrer started their sparkling wine production here.

Oak Knoll District Here, average summer temperatures are several degrees cooler compared to the likes of St Helena and Calistoga, mostly thanks to the cooling fog and breezes from San Pablo Bay 15 miles (25km) to the south. With a warm spring and a cool summer, the growing season here can span more than eight months and run into October, giving grapes ample time to ripen fully and develop complexity, while not losing critical acidity. The Bordeaux grape varieties Cabernet Sauvignon, Cabernet Franc, Merlot and Malbec hold sway among Oak Knoll District's red wines. Chardonnay is the pick of the white grapes here, and benefits just as much from the extended growing season as the reds do. Oak Knoll District is not to be confused with the longer-established Oakville AVA a short dis-



tance to the north, on the far side of Yountville. While Oak Knoll District has made significant progress towards establishing itself on the top tier of Napa AVAs, it still has work to do before gaining the prestige enjoyed by Oakville.

The Oakville AVA is an officially demarcated two-mile-wide swath of Napa Valley that extends to 1,000 feet in elevation up the base of the Vaca Mountains to the east and 500 feet in elevation in the Mayacamas Mountains to the west. Within this small district you will find the greatest concentration of Napa Valley's preeminent producers of Cabernet Sauvignon. The Oakville district was one of the first distinctive wine growing regions within Napa Valley to be officially recognized when it was granted AVA (American Viticultural Area) status in 1993. Today, the Oakville Winegrowers' Association boasts more than 70 growers and wineries.

The area is particularly known for its very tannic Cabernet Sauvignon varietal wines that have the capability of aging well in the bottle.

Influenced by the local topography, diurnal temperature variation is high here, giving the grapes the opportunity to bask in the Californian sunshine throughout the day and cool down overnight. Grapes develop intense color and flavor without becoming baked by stifling overnight heat. This shows in Howell Mountain wines, which are celebrated for their acid structure and aromatic depth. Howell Mountain's soil types are also influenced by the topography.



Robert Foley Vineyards Merlot (Napa, California)

The Coombsville AVA is an American Viticultural Area located within the Napa Valley AVA just east of the city of Napa. The appellation varies from near sea level at the Napa River on the west to 1,900 feet at the ridge of the Vaca Mountain Range. Cooling effects of marine air and fog occur almost daily during the growing season, arriving earlier and lingering longer than in the more northern regions of Napa Valley. The Coombsville soils are dominated by the volcanic rhyolitic tuff sedimentary rock and lava flows of the Vaca Range on the eastern side of the Napa Valley.

Far Niente 'Dolce' Late Harvest Semillon/Sauvignon Blanc 500ml

This is divinely sweet without ever becoming cloying. A blend of 89% Sémillon and 11% Sauvignon Blanc. The 2012 Dolce is bursting with flavors of apricot and orange liqueur. Enticing fruit-forward aromas persist throughout the wine. On the palate, mouthwatering layers of vanilla and brioche mingle with lush fruit. A rich, distinctive texture and a smooth, coating mouthfeel carry this wine's full flavors into a long and satisfying finish.

Faust The Pact Cabernet Sauvignon Coombsville, Napa Valley

The Pact 2019 lives up to Faust legend with beautiful dark blueberry and blackberry aromas over layers of crushed rock minerality, haunting forest notes and hints of violet. With the texture of velvet—luxuriously dense—the palate wraps that core of blue and back fruit with the barest edge of bright cherry spiced with star anise and savory dried tarragon. Silky tannins and generous ripe fruit linger through an endless, vibrant finish. There's a long life ahead for this Cabernet.

The Stags Leap District AVA is an American Viticultural Area located within the Napa Valley AVA 6 miles north of the city of Napa, California. The Stags Leap District was the first appellation to be designated an AVA based on the unique terroir characteristics of its soil. The west-facing hillsides of the Palisades reflect warmth, creating high daytime temperatures that ripen opulent Cabernet. However, the location in the southern half of Napa Valley and its proximity to the San Pablo Bay draws in cool air in the late afternoons causing very low nighttime temperatures.

The Calistoga AVA (formally established in 2010) is situated in the northern part of California's famous Napa Valley. Calistoga has been producing high quality wine grapes since 1853. Growers in the region have volcanic soils, hot, dry summers and cool nights thanks to breezes off the Russian River. Calistoga is also the wettest of the Napa Valley AVAs with as much as 60 inches of rain per year. Currently there are around 2,500 acres of vineyard land planted with Cabernet Sauvignon, Zinfandel, Syrah, and Petite Sirah.



Arling Blaze, Sigrid in Black Napa Valley 55% Zinfandel, 40% Cabernet Sauvignon, 54 5% Merlot Black as ink. Dark chocolate with blackberries picked from from the thorns. An aggressive, savory depth to this blend. Richer, but more linear. Sigrid in Black is about depth, concentration, and latent power. The Zinfandel from Calistoga takes centerstage.

Sonoma County's large number (18) of American Viticulture Areas (AVAs) reflect the wide variety of climate and soil conditions in the County, the large production in the County, and the prominence of Sonoma County in the wine market. The difference in climate and soil (terroir), means that cooler climate grapes grow well in certain regions and in others warm climate grapes are more suitable. The large production of the County means that each AVA is significant in its own right. The prominence of the California wine industry



and Sonoma County in particular has established worldwide recognition of their wine regions. At the same time, many consumers have been confused by the many different AVAs within Sonoma County. The growers voted in 2006 to form a Sonoma County Winegrape Commission, representing more than 1,800 growers. The Commission seeks to raise recognition for Sonoma County and encourages all wine from the county to bear the mark "Sonoma County" on it. The following are appellations in Sonoma County: Alexander Valley, Bennett Valley, Chalk Hill, Dry Creek Valley, Fort Ross-Seaview, Fountaingrove District, Green Valley of Russian River Valley, Knights Valley, Los Carneros, Moon Mountain District Sonoma County, Northern Sonoma, Petaluma Gap, Pine Mountain-Cloverdale Peak, Rockpile, Russian River Valley, Sonoma Coast, Sonoma Valley, and Sonoma Mountain.

Russian River Valley: The Russian River Valley AVA does not strictly outline the path of the Russian River, which flows from Mendocino County south-by-southeast through Alexander Valley, makes an abrupt left at Healdsburg, and cuts west through rugged terrain to the Pacific Ocean. Rather like a heart in its shape, roughly 15 miles wide and tall, the AVA occupies a 'sweet spot' that's cool, but not too cold. By wide margins,

Chardonnay, Pinot Noir and Zinfandel top the charts in this AVA, and in that order. Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon, and Sauvignon Blanc are next in acreage, but the small amount of cool-climate Syrah produced here may get more attention among wine collectors. Pinot Gris and Gewürztraminer are also important.

The mountainous conditions and constant breezes prove favorable for growing structured cabernet sauvignon, zinfandel, syrah, and merlot.

Elevations in Chalk Hill are higher; soil fertility is lower. In amazing proximity, the soils range from shallow to deep, from thin to thick, from gravel and rock to heavy clay. An old river bed caps one hill; an unusual serpentine vein ranges through another and, under the topsoil, is a distinctive layer of chalk-colored volcanic ash which inspired the name of Chalk Hill, the appellation

"My Way" expresses the style of wine the owner/winemaker (John Monnich) prefers, and if it hits the floor, it doesn't splash! Becomes stellar with a 15 - 30-minute aerating. This wine will easily keep for at least 15-20 years.

Alexander Valley AVA is a Californian American Viticultural Area just north of Healdsburg in Sonoma County. It is home to many wineries and vineyards, as well as the city of Cloverdale. It is the largest and most fully planted wine region in Sonoma. Cabernet Sauvignon reigns in Alexander Valley; some of America's most loved Cabernets are grown and made here. Merlot and other Bordeaux varietals are important, particularly in mountain sites above the valley; Chardonnay and Sauvignon Blanc hold their own; some of the county's finest old vine Zinfandel is grown here often made by small wineries, and snapped up fast. A few wineries have located old vine Grenache; newer plantings of Sangiovese show promise.



Aperture Red Blend Alexander Valley Sonoma CA

40% Malbec, 34% Merlot, 14% Cabernet Sauvignon, 10% Cabernet Franc, 2% Petit Verdot. For this vintage, Aperture crafted a distinct Bordeaux blend. The ripe fruit characters are structured by seamless tannins, showcasing an elegant density to the blend. Deep ruby-purple in color, the nose bursts with lilac perfume, Morello cherries, cured meats, star anise, tar, and a mineral undercurrent. The palate is pixelated and lifted with glorious perfume lingering on the exceptionally long finish. This is a WOW wine!

Knights Valley: abuts the Alexander Valley AVA to the west, Chalk Hill to the south, and cozies up to Calistoga (in Napa Valley) on the east. The only practical access to the valley is via twisty sections of Highway 128 through mountainous terrain; the road eventually straightens out in a high valley, where it's bordered by stately oaks draped with Spanish moss. Vineyards take the lion's share of the valley floor, but cattle operations are also important. Ancient, volcanic Mount Saint Helena, which stretches into Sonoma, Napa, and Lake counties, towers over Knights Valley. Protected from direct Pacific Ocean influence, the

valley is the warmest of Sonoma County's viticulture areas. Warm afternoons and cool evenings provide the ideal environment for growing Bordeaux grape varieties. Cabernet Sauvignon remains the star in the valley. Also present are the rest of the Meritage blend: Merlot, Cabernet Franc, Malbec, and Petit Verdot, as well as Sauvignon blanc, Chardonnay, Viognier, Syrah, and some limited plantings of other varietals.

Peter Michael Ma Belle Fille Chardonnay, Knights Valley, Sanoma California

(100% Chardonnay) Ma Belle Fille is the highest of the Peter Michael vineyards, located at 1,200-1,800 feet. Planted to a field selection of Hudson, Old Wente, Montrachet and Calera clones, it is also the earliest ripening vineyard. A bright, light straw color, Ma Belle-Fille bursts from the glass with vine blossom, pure liquid minerals, ripe nectarines, white flowers, creamed hazelnut, pastry elements, and Raenette apple giving way to a beautiful perfume of honeysuckle, beeswax, and tangerine peel, plus a waft of cashews. On the palate, noticeable layer upon layer of stone, minerals, grilled bread, and jasmine are accentuated with an oily, full-bodied concentration. The finish is complex and expansive with a purity of lingering lemon curd, vanilla bean, yellow flowers, and nougat with hints of cinnamon and pain d'épices finishing on a long-lasting honey-nut note.

California: Sacramento Valley (not an AVA)

The Sacramento Valley runs for approximately 120 miles from Red Bluff in the northern end of the valley to the city of Sacramento. Bordered by the Sierra Nevada to the east and the Coast Ranges to the west, this level, sundrenched, agriculturally rich area is unaffected by ocean influences. The region has about 8,000 acres of winegrapes. Chardonnay is the most prominent variety and Zinfandel follows. There are some 16 wineries, and approximately two percent of the total state winegrape crush comes from this region.



The Clarksburg AVA is an American Viticultural Area that spans three counties in California's Sacramento Valley. Located in portions of Sacramento County, Solano County, and Yolo County, the Clarksburg AVA includes 64,640 acres (26,159 ha) near the town of Clarksburg. The growing region has dense clay and loam soils.



Aperture Cellars, Chenin Blanc North Coast Coming from the rich clay loam soils of an old vine California Chenin Blanc site, planted in the 1940s, this vibrant wine showcases notes of passion fruit, nectarines, and honeysuckle with brightly lifted acidity giving way to a round, smooth mouthfeel.

California: San Joaquin Valley

The San Joaquin Valley is comprised of the counties of Stanislaus, Merced, Madera, Fresno, Tulare, Kings, and Kern and is home to four American Viticultural Areas (AVAs). It measures about 220 miles in length and 40 to 80 miles in width, extending from around Modesto in the North to the Tehachapi Mountains in the South. Although the Sacramento and San Joaquin Valleys are not designated AVAs, the region produces 71 percent of the state's wine grapes and is home to eight AVAs — Clarksburg, Diablo Grande, Dunnigan Hills, Lodi, Madera, Merritt Island, River Junction and Salado Creek.

Lodi AVA. The following sub-appellations based upon distinctions primarily having to do with differing soils and topographies, more subtle climate-related differences, plus additional evidence demonstrating precedent in terms of historic usage of the proposed place names within each respective region. The seven additional Lodi AVAs approved in August 2006: Alta Mesa, Borden Ranch, Clements Hills, Cosumnes River, Jahant, Mokelumne River, and Sloughhouse



Rowdy Bush Petite Syrah, Lodi (Central Valley, California)

A deep, dark color and bold aromas of roadtar and baked blueberries precede dark-chocolate and blackberry flavors in this full-bodied and moderately tannic wine. It is super flavorful but does not overwhelm the palate

California: Santa Barbara

Santa Barbara wine country is sandwiched between two mountain ranges with elevations ranging from 200 feet in the valley to 3400 feet in the hillside vineyards. The transverse (ahem... East to West) nature of these mountain ranges is unique to the region and forms a collage of microclimates and soil types while keeping the region cool. Soils range from pockets of calcareous limestone that help maintain acidity, diatomaceous earth (aka DE) creates concentrated wines, sandy soils make more fruit driven styles, and finally, clay loam mixtures retain moisture for thirsty vines.

Happy Canyon of Santa Barbara: Located in the far eastern edge of the Santa Ynez Valley AVA, Happy Canyon of Santa Barbara has one of the most sweeping entrances in the region. A drive down Armor Ranch Road drops you into this gorgeous valley with incredible views of San Rafael Mountains just northwest of Lake Cachuma. Elevations range from 500 feet to over 3,400, with a north-south orientation. Its inland position means a significantly warmer climate that ensures complete maturation for later ripening varieties. The rolling terrain, high slopes and varied soils of this region are best suited for growing Bordeaux varieties like Cabernet Franc, Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Petit Verdot and Sauvignon Blanc, creating rich, concentrated wines. Syrah and other Rhône varieties also flourish here. Head to this Happy for the vistas but call ahead for access to these exclusive vineyards.



California: Santa Barbara

Sta. Rita Hills is part of the larger Santa Ynez Valley AVA, located between the towns of Lompoc and Buellton with the Purisima Hills on the north and the Santa Rosa Hills on the south. The wine region is exposed to fog and coastal breezes from the nearby Pacific Ocean. The hills run east to west, which allows cool ocean breezes from the nearby Pacific Ocean to enter the valley created by the hills and create a cool micro-climate. When combined with the rocky nature of the area, the Santa Rita Hills area is well-suited for the growing of Pinot noir grapes, which tend to do well in cool climates with rocky soil. The region is best known for Chardonnay, Pinot noir, and Syrah varietal wines.



Sea Smoke Estate Vineyards 'Ten' Pinot Noir Santa Rita Hills, California (HIGHLY ALLOCATED ~ GENERALLY UNAVAILABLE) 100% Pinot Noir. A brooding and intense wine. Fresh aromas of smashed black cherry, dark strawberry, and fig, then a myriad of savory spices and a hint of jasmine prove quite juicy on the nose of this bottling, while tarragon, cinnamon and nutmeg elements add nuance. The palate is like a bowlful of cherries and strawberries, sprinkled generously with chai and French toast spices, proving immensely easy to drink.

Canada

Canada's wine growing regions are situated within the recognized growing zones of 30 and 50 degrees latitude north, which is shared by many other cool climate wine regions in Europe. Our primary winegrowing regions are the Niagara Peninsula in southern Ontario and the Okanagan Valley in southern British Columbia, along with other regions in each of these provinces and smaller producing areas found in Quebec and Nova Scotia. Although small in scale by world standard, wine is a growing business in Canada, with wineries sprouting up wherever soil and climate permit the growing of productive



vines. The major wine regions are Lake Erie North Shore, Niagara Peninsula, Prince Edward County, Nova Scotia, Okanagan, Similkameen, Naramata Bench, and Vancouver Island.

Okanagan Valley: located within the region of the same name in the British Columbia Interior, is Canada's secondlargest wine producing area. Along with the nearby Similkameen Valley, the approximately 8,619 acres (3,488 hectares) of vineyards planted in the Okanagan (2018 data) account for more than 80% of all wine produced in British Columbia, and are second in economic importance for wine production to the Niagara Peninsula of Ontario. Nearly every style of wine is produced across the whole spectrum of sweetness levels that include still, sparkling, fortified and dessert wines—most notably ice wines. There are more than 60 grape varieties grown in the Oka-



nagan including Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon, Pinot noir, Pinot gris, Chardonnay, Auxerrois blanc, Marechal Foch and Cabernet Franc. Additionally many German varieties are still found throughout the Okanagan including Riesling, Gewürztraminer, Bacchus, Optima, Ehrenfelser, Kerner, Siegerebe. In the 21st century, growers have been planting more warm climate varieties typically not associated with the Canadian wine industry. Recent plantings include Sangiovese, Syrah, Tempranillo, Trebbiano, Pinotage, Malbec, Barbera and Zinfandel.

Painted Rock Merlot, Single Estate, Okanagan Valley, BC, Canada

(100% Merlot) Aromas of dark plums, red fruit and chocolate intermingle with eucalyptus and sweet baking spices in the glass. On the palate the acidity is fresh and well-integrated, and there are further notes of fig and violet on the finish with fine grained tannins.

Chile

Chilean wine has a long history for a New World wine region, as it was the 16th century when the Spanish conquistadors brought Vitis vinifera vines with them as they colonized the region. In the mid-19th century, French wine varieties such as Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Carmenère and Franc were introduced. In the early 1980s, a renaissance began with the introduction of stainless steel fermentation tanks and the use of oak barrels for aging. Wine exports grew very quickly as quality wine production increased. Chile is now the fifth largest exporter of wines in the world, and the seventh largest producer. The most common grapes are Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot and Carmenère. So far Chile has remained free of the phylloxera louse, which means that the country's grapevines do not need to be grafted with phylloxera-resistant rootstocks. The wine regions of Chile include the Atacama Region, Coquimbo Region, Aconcagua Region, Central Valley Region, and the Southern Chile Region.



Coquimbo Region: centered on Elqui River in northern Chile. The Elqui Valley Denomination of Origin (DO) is defined by the Chilean appellation system, the legally defined and protected geographical indication used to identify where the grapes for a wine were grown. The region's vineyards extend from the Pacific Ocean in the west to the Andes Mountains in the east, and rise to an elevation of 2,000 meters above sea level (6,500 feet). The region has clay, silt and chalk soil, and is characterized by a sunny, desert-like climate, less than 70 millimetres (2.8 in) of annual rainfall, dry rocky terrain, steep valleys and temperate hills cooled by strong winds from the Pacific Ocean and the Andes Mountains, producing excellent results for varietals like Syrah.



Aconcagua Region: The Aconcagua wine region is a warm, dry area with high daytime temperatures. These extreme conditions might cause vine disease, but the mild and cooler air from the Pacific Ocean cools the soil in the evening and moderate the temperature during the day. The soil of the Aconcagua wine region is mainly made up of sand. This soil type is common also throughout all subregions. The sandy soil has one advantage, it creates a phylloxerafree environment, where vines grow very healthy.

(100% Sauvignon Blanc) Bright greenish-yellow in color. Very expressive character and elegant with delicate freshness and minerality. Highly complex. Good combination of herbal, gooseberry, lime, and grapefruit notes. Medium- to full-bodied with sweet ripeness, and sea and salty notes, chalky nuances, citrus, lemon curd, and herbal notes. Deep and lingering finish. Well-balanced, with crisp, juicy acidity.

Chile

Central Valley (El Valle Central) of Chile is one of the most important wine-producing areas in South America in terms of volume, stretching from the Maipo Valley (just south of Santiago) to the southern end of the Maule Valley.

Colchagua Valley, in central Chile, is one of South America's most promising wine regions. It forms the south-western half of the larger Rapel Valley region; to the north and east of it lies the less famous but equally promising Cachapoal Valley.

Montes Wines, Icon Series Montes Alpha M Colchagua Valley Chile

(Cabernet Sauvignon 80%, Cabernet Franc 10%, Merlot 5% y Petit Verdot 5%.) The production of Montes Alpha M is extremely limited, and vintages are only released if the head winemaker, Aurelio Montes considers the quality of the wine to be of a good enough standard. A bold Bordeaux style wine. The nose is perfumed and complex with outstanding aromas of ripe red and black fruits over subtle notes of crème de cassis, tobacco, and leather. Spice aromas of red and black pepper mingle with cinnamon and dark chocolate notes. In palate is smooth but structured, with silky tannins.

Maipo Valley: Maipo Valley is the closest Chilean wine region to Santiago, the capital city of Chile. The valley includes over 7,302 acres (2,955 ha) of vineyards, more than half of which are dedicated to producing Cabernet Sauvignon or Cabernet blends. The Maipo Valley can be divided in three sub-regions: Alto Maipo, Central Maipo, and Pacific Maipo.

China

The most renowned wine-growing regions include **Hong Kong**, **Shandong**, **Yunnan**, **Ningxia**, **Shaanxi**, **and Hebei**. Nowadays, China is in the top ten global markets of fine wine consumption. Most definite in the next few decades, the country's wine production and wine consumption will rise tremendously.

Ningxia: Ningxia is a significant wine-producing region in the central-north of China. The wide, heavily irrigated valley between the Yellow River and the base of Helan Mountain has proved to be one of China's most promising vineyard areas. The climate is extremely continental—short and hot summers are moderated by high altitude (with some vineyards sit 1200m above sea level) and cool nights, which help to slow down the ripening process and retain acidity. Winter in Ningxia is long and harsh, producers need to bury their vines early November then dig them out in March next year, adding extra costs to the production.

Croatia

Wine has been produced in Croatia for some 2,500 years, since the land was inhabited by the Ancient Greeks. Therefore, it's no surprise that many of the traditional, indigenous grapes originally used in winemaking continue to be used today, as they are perfect for the Croatian climate, though the names may be unfamiliar outside of Croatia. There are four main wine regions in Croatia – Croatian Uplands, Istria, and Kvarner, Slavonia and Podunavlje, and the Dalmatian wine region. There are also sixteen sub-regions and 66 appellations. Each with different climates, geographical features, traditions, and local grape varieties.



Grgić Vina, Korčula Island Pošip Croatia

100% Pošip. Grgić Vina was established in 1996 by legendary Napa Valley winemaker, Croatian-born Miljenko "Mike" Grgich and his daughter, Violet Grgich. The winery is perched overlooking the Adriatic Sea just north of the historic walled city, Dubrovnik, in the southern Dalmatia wine region of Croatia. Essence of grapefruit, chèvre, and white stone. White stonefruit, kaffir lime leaf, and briny minerality on the palate. Long finish of green apples. Stellar Pošip from Korčula.

France: Beaujolais

Beaujolais is an important wine region of eastern France, famous for its vibrant, fruity red wines made from Gamay. It is located immediately south of Burgundy, of which it is sometimes considered to be a part, despite being within the Rhone administrative region. The widespread plantings of Gamay here make Beaujolais one of the few regions of the world to be so focused on a single grape variety. Pinot Noir is used in small quantities in red and rosé wines, but in the name of regional identity it is being phased out and will be permitted only until the harvest of 2015. Although best known



for its red wines, the region also produces white Beaujolais Blanc, from Chardonnay and Aligote. These two white-wine varieties are also sometimes used in the local red wines, in which they may constitute up to 15% of the final blend. There are several forms of red Beaujolais wines: standard Beaujolais (including Beaujolais Superieur), Beaujolais Villages, and the characterful, youthful Beaujolais Nouveau. The region's highest-quality wines are those of the ten Beaujolais 'crus' – ten vineyard areas long recognized as the finest in the area. Each of these ten (Brouilly, Chenas, Chiroubles, Cote de Brouilly, Fleurie, Julienas, Morgon, Moulin-a-Vent, Regnie and Saint-Amour) has its own appellation title.

It also encompasses Haut-Médoc, Listrac-Médoc and Moulis-en-Médoc appellations. The Left Bank is where you will find all the First Growth Bordeaux, as well as all the other 1855 Classified Bordeaux wines of the Medoc including the Second Growths, Third Growths, Fourth Growths and Fifth Growths. In the Left Bank of Bordeaux, more than 200 chateaux can be found that are classified as Cru Bourgeois. The Left Bank is also the home of all the Cru Bourgeois estates.



Domaines Barons de Rothschild, Lafite Legende R Medoc (Bordeaux, France)

The nose is rich, complex, with aromas of dark berries, sweet spices (vanilla, cinnamon) and burnt notes. Ripe black fruit character, supple tannins, and sweet spice. Elegant. (D, WE 90pts)

Pauillac, Haut-Médoc: A commune located between Saint-Estèphe and Saint-Julien on Bordeaux's Left Bank Médoc peninsula, is home to some of the world's most famous and expensive red wines wines, made predominantly from the Cabernet Sauvignon grape variety, which is well suited to the free-draining gravel soils found in Pauillac's vineyards. Classic Pauillac wines have juicy flavors of black-currant and cedar, often with coffee, chocolate and graphite notes.

Château Pape Clément, founded at the turn of the fourteenth century by the future Pope Clement V, the first named chateaux in Bordeaux.



Sauternes and Barsac. Sauternes is a subregion of Graves known for its intensely sweet, white, dessert wines such as the Premier Cru Supérieur classified Château d'Yquem. Wines produced in the region of Barsac, such as Premiers Crus Château Climens and Château Coutet are allowed to be labeled either with the commune name or with Sauternes. The three main grapes of this area are Sémillon, Sauvignon blanc and Muscadelle.

Saint-Estèphe AOC: an Appellation d'Origine Contrôlée (AOC) for red wine in the Bordeaux region, located in the Médoc subregion. It takes its name from the commune of Saint-Estèphe and is the northernmost of the six communal appellations in Médoc. Five classified growths of 1855 (Bordeaux Grands Crus Classés en 1855) are located within the appellation area. Saint-Estèphe has held AOC recognition since 1936. The varieties allowed for this appellation are Cabernet Franc, Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Carménère, Côt and Petit Verdot. The AOC regulations do not stipulate the exact proportions to be combined, [4] but in practice most blends consist predominantly of Cabernet Sauvignon. The proportions



according to which the six varieties are combined give the wines from each château or estate their own distinctive personality. While some châteaux increase the proportion of Merlot in order to make their young wines easier on the palate, others continue to grow a majority of Cabernet Sauvignon.

Chateau Cos d'Estournel, Saint-Estephe, Medoc, Bordeaux

It takes its name from the commune Saint-Julien-Beychevelle and is one of the six communal appellations in Médoc. A number of classified (Grand Cru Classé) Bordeaux estates are located within the appellation. Some of the wines from Saint Julien can be easily confused with Bordeaux wine from Pauillac, which is easy to understand as Pauillac and St. Julien are only a vine away on the northern side of St. Julien. Other Bordeaux wines from St. Julien are on the elegant, refined side of the style of range. There are Saint Julien estates that are able to majestically pair concentration with elegance and purity Some chateaux remain traditional in their winemaking, while others lean to a more modern approach. There are easily driving wines and wines that days and decades in the contraction of the style of th



proach. There are early drinking wines and wines that demand decades in the cellar.

Chateau Ducru Beaucaillou, Saint Julien, Haut-Médoc, Bordeaux France

France: Bordeaux (Right Bank)

The Right Bank lived in the shadows of its neighbors across the river until a man named Robert Parker came along. He heaped all sorts of praise and high scores on the modern "garagiste" (A term originally used in the Bordeaux region of France to denigrate renegade small-lot wine makers) approach many producers used to make their Merlot blends. Rich in fruit, with less tannin and acid, these wines usually seem more enjoyable at a young age. More of a "garagiste" feel, with small, modest family producers instead of premier chateaux. Merlot is the most planted grape, with a lot of Cabernet Franc and some Petit Verdot, Malbec and Cabernet Sauvignon. The result is softer style.



Lussac-Saint-Émilion: An Appellation d'origine contrôlée (AOC) for red wine situated in the Bordeaux wine region. The appellation is located on the right bank of the Garonne and Dordogne rivers, about 45 kilometres (28 mi) from city of Bordeaux or 9 kilometres (5.6 mi) from the medieval village of Saint-Émilion. It is one of the so-called "Saint-Émilion satellites" situated around the appellation Saint-Émilion AOC itself. The grapes permitted within the Lussac-Saint-Emilion appellation are Merlot, Malbec, Cabernet Franc and Cabernet Sauvignon. Merlot is the dominant variety by far, most often partnered with Cabernet Franc (known here as 'Bouchet').

France: Bordeaux (Right Bank)

Gravelly near the river Dordogne, the clay soils at the foot hills become clay limestone and limestone on the plateau. 3 major types of terroir which offer the perfect solution for winemakers to produce and grow exceptional quality wines.

Canon Fronsac AOC is a sub-appellation contained entirely within Fronsac AOC in the southern area nearest the Dordogne river. The AOC produces red wines only, which are based primarily on Merlot. The major grape varieties grown, with approximate acreage given in parentheses, are Merlot (almost 80%), Cabernet Franc (almost 15%), and Cabernet Sauvignon (under 10%). The appellation covers 771 has with approximately 100 winemakers producing



covers 771 ha, with approximately 100 winemakers producing 5 million bottles per year.

Château Recougne (Bordeaux Supérieur, France)

A pleasant fruity nose, a deep and powerful structure and round, velvety tannins make for a very elegant, rich, and complex bottle of wine.

France: Bordeaux (Right Bank)

Pomerol is a red wine appellation located on the right bank of the Dordogne River in Bordeaux, France. Unlike the classification systems used in St.-Émilion and the famous 1855 Classification utilized in the Haut-Médoc, there is no such system based on quality and prestige to rank the chateaus of Pomerol. Unlike the Cabernet Sauvignon-driven wines created in the communes situated on the Dordogne River's left bank, Merlot and Cabernet Franc are the choice varieties in Pomerol. These red blends typically create wines with a plump, velvety mouthfeel and a notable plummy depth.

France: Bourgogne Region

Burgundy wine (French: Bourgogne or vin de Bourgogne) is wine made in the Burgundy region in eastern France, [1] in the valleys and slopes west of the Saône, a tributary of the Rhône. The most famous wines produced here—those commonly referred to as Burgundies"—are dry red wines made from pinot noir grapes and white wines made from chardonnay grapes. Red and white wines are also made from other grape varieties, such as gamay and aligoté, respectively.




Chablis ("Shah-blee") is a Chardonnay making wine region in the northwest corner of Burgundy, France. Unlike other Chardonnay wines, Chablis rarely uses oak -aging, resulting in a very different style and taste profile. It's because of Chablis' renown that the unoaked Chardonnay style is popular worldwide.



Domaine de Charmoy Chablis (Chardonnay) Bourgogne France

This is a bright, crisp wine with a pretty lemon, limestone and slightly floral nose. The palate is citrusy, mostly lemon backed up with some peach, green apple and more minerality. Good developing finish in a nice Chablis.

Côte d'Or Appellation: The vines of the Bourgogne Côte d'Or appellation extend across an area 65km long and between 1-2km wide, from Dijon to the Maranges. Geographically speaking, the Côte d'Or (golden slope) covers the Côte de Beaune and the Côte de Nuits. The vines of the Bourgogne Côte d'Or appellation look like a diagonal fault line running from northeast to southwest, in a succession of slopes at between 200 and 450m above sea level.

It is still in the main area of Burgundy wine production but it includes no Grand cru vineyards. Like the Côte d'Or, it is at the western edge of the broad valley of the river Saône, on the rising ground overlooking the town of Chalonsur-Saône which is about six kilometers out into the plain. To the north lies the Côte de Beaune. To the south is the Mâconnais.



Maison Chanzy Bouzeron Cote Chalonnaise (Aligoté) Clos De La Fortune Monopole

Aligoté possesses naturally high acidity and is often described as tart and neutral. The variety is capable of excellent quality when planted in a top site such as Clos de la Fortune where it achieves riper flavors and richer texture. Aging partially in oak barrels lends additional roundness and complexity to this exceptional example of Aligoté.



France: Bourgogne Region

Louis Latour Beaune, Cote de Beaune, Cote d'Or, Burgundy, Premier Cru An intense ruby, cherry red color and tight, concentrated aromas of sweet black cherry and raspberry fruit, chocolate, spice and black pepper. Medium bodied, the palate offers a restrained elegance and power with succulent, round tannins and is a wine with a long silky finish.

Mâconnais. The most southerly region, and the largest of Burgundy. Located between the town of Tournus and St. Veran, it lies at the crossroads between Northern and Southern France. The change is striking. The main area, and the most famous, is in the south: Pouilly-Fuissé. This region is a beautiful, open amphitheater of vineyards. The surrounding villages lay in the valley bottom, cast in the shadow of Mont Solutré and Mont Vergisson. Many of the vineyards border Beaujolais, just over the hills to the south. The soils here are full of limestone with a little granite as well. The wines are white, made from Chardonnay, and display



soft apple, pineapple, and white peach aromas, with wonderful structure and freshness.

Chateau Vitallis Pouilly-Fuisse (Chardonnay), Maconnais (Burgundy, France)

Fleurie Wine Region is a well known Cru Beaujolais wine appellation for red wines from the Gamay grape variety. The wines are some of the most highly regarded in the region, which is sometimes referred to as "The Queen of Beaujolais". Fleurie is in the center of the ten Beaujolais crus. It lies just south of Moulin-à-Vent and Chénas and to the north of Morgon. Chiroubles lies just to the west. The area's vineyards sit on the western side of the Beaujolais hills, on south and southeast facing slopes overlooking the Saone River valley. Fleurie vineyards are generally planted on pink granite soil.

France: Champagne

Champagne, lying to the east of the Paris region, is one of the great historic provinces of France. As far back as the times of the Emperor Charlemagne, in the ninth century, Champagne was one of the great regions of Europe, a rich agricultural area that was famous for its fairs. Today, thanks to a type of sparkling wine to which the region has given its name, the word Champagne is known worldwide – even if many



of those who know the drink do not know exactly where it comes from. The Champagne-Ardenne area consists of four departments - the Ardennes, the Aube, the Marne and the Haute-Marne. The area is bordered by Belgium in the north, by Lorraine in the east, by Franche-Comté and Burgundy in the south, and by the Paris region and Picardy in the west.

Montagne de Reims is one of the five sub-regions of the Champagne wine region. It is north of Vallée de la Marne, Côte de Sézanne and Côte des Blancs. The region is located around Reims Mountain, from Reims to Épernay, and contains nine Grands Crus villages. Its soils are chalkbased, with striations of loam, lignite, clay, sand, silt, and marl. Pinot Noir is the main grape cultivated.

France: Compte Tolosan and Chablis

Comte Tolosan is an IGP title that covers wines produced in a large area of South West France. The catchment area of the IGP encompasses 12 administrative departments, and is home to a wide range of AOC-level appellations such as Jurançon, Cahors and Armagnac. The IGP label provides a geographical classification to wines which do not classify for the AOC-level appellations due to the grape variety or winemaking style. The grape varieties permitted in Comté Tolosan IGP wines are indicative of the region's location: local



grape varieties such as Petit Manseng, Colombard, Tannat and Cot (Malbec) are all a part of the various AOC appellations as well as the IGP level wines. This list is also populated by better-known grape varieties such as Chardonnay, Merlot and Cabernet Sauvignon.

VSE Vino San Estaben Private Selection Malbec Comté Tolosan, France

Chablis: The northernmost wine district of the Burgundy region in France. The cool climate of this region produces wines with more acidity and flavors less fruity than Chardonnay wines grown in warmer climates. These wines often have a "flinty" note, sometimes described as "goût de pierre à fusil" ("tasting of gunflint"), and sometimes as "steely". The Chablis Appellation d'origine contrôlée is required to use Chardonnay grapes solely. The grapevines around the town of Chablis make a dry white wine renowned for the purity of its aroma and taste. In comparison with the white wines from the rest of Burgundy, Chablis wine has typically much less influence of oak. Most



basic Chablis is unoaked, and vinified in stainless steel tanks. The amount of barrel maturation, if any, is a stylistic choice which varies widely among Chablis producers. Many Grand Cru and Premier Cru wines receive some maturation in oak barrels, but typically the time in barrel and the proportion of new barrels is much smaller than for white wines of Côte de Beaune.

J. Moreau & Fils Chablis (Chardonnay) Les Clos Grand Cru

Seven climats or single vineyards have contributed to the worldwide fame of the great white wines of Chablis: Les Clos, Vaudésir, Valmur, Blanchot, Les Preuses, Grenouilles, and Bougros. The very first Chablis vineyards were most likely planted in Les Clos since we can find traces of vines grown there before 1267. J. Moreau has a long and successful history...established in 1814, the year of Napoleon's abdication. Pale gold in color. Candied fruit, pistachio, honey, and lightly toasted nougat on the nose. Rich and round with notes of acacia honey and citrus. This is certainly the "best of the best."

The Rhône Valley has been a hub of wine culture since ancient times and is just as popular today. "There's no place like Rhône." Viticulture as we know it arrived in Southern France with the Greeks in the 4th century BC. But it was the Romans who really established the vineyards and reputation of the area using the Rhône as their highway through France (and planting a few vineyards along the way). Châteauneuf-du-Pape means "The Pope's New Crib" The Catholic Church was the next main influence when Pope Clement V moved his headquarters from Rome to Avignon in 1309.



The Northern Rhône is a mere 40 miles long and is responsible for a tiny 4-5% of all the wines from the region. The climate is 'Continental'—hot summers, cold winters and precipitation throughout the year. Probably the most striking feature is the steepness of the hillsides. This is the birthplace of Syrah and where many wine lovers find it reaches its height of expression — full bodied, savory, and elegant. As the Rhône River progresses southward, the valley widens and the climate changes. The region is distinctly more 'Provençal' with a Mediterranean influence in culture and climate. If Syrah is the big boy of the North, Grenache is the King in the South and forms the foundation of the area's popular blends. You'll also encounter Mourvedre, Cinsault, Counoise, Carignan, Grenache Blanc, Marsanne, Roussanne, Clairette, Bourboulenc and a host of minor players.

JP-Bourgeois, Côtes du Rhône Cuvée Vincent

100% Syrah. Cuvée Vincent is made from 50+ year-old vines. Its unusual composition of 100% Syrah imbues it with the smoky aromas and meaty, savory flavors more associated with the legendary wines of Hermitage and Côte-Rotie in the Northern Rhône, but with the generosity of tart cherry, blackberry, blueberry, and dark spices one expects from the more lush Southern Rhône. (NR)

Châteauneuf-du-Pape is a French wine appellation known for its bold Grenache-based red blends. Officially, the region makes both red and white wines with up to 13 different grapes. (Unofficially, there are 20 varieties used in the region!). Châteauneuf-du-Pape literally translates to "The Pope's new castle" and, indeed, the history of this appellation is firmly entwined with papal history.

Gigondas AOC. is a village in the southern Rhône valley and n appellation for red and rosé wines. Both colors are made from up to 80 percent Grenache (according to the appellation laws), with at least 15 percent comprised of Syrah and Mourvèdre. Any Gigondas wine may have a maximum of 10 percent of any variety sanctioned by the standard red Côtes du Rhône appellation laws, with the exception of Carignan. The resulting style of wine made under the appellation is often likened to that of Châteauneuf-du-Pape, just 17 kilometers (10 miles) to the southwest. Red wines are typically bold, forward, ripe and relatively high in alcohol - in fact, the appellation



laws require a minimum alcohol level of 12.5 percent, one of the highest stipulated for French red wine. The best examples can certainly match many bottlings from its more famous neighbor. The quality measures taken in the creation of Gigondas' wines include the mandatory selection of healthy grapes over imperfect grapes, known in French as triage. Maximum yield is set at 36 hectoliters per hectare, only 1hl more than Châteauneuf-du-Pape (385 vs 374 US gallons per acre). The appellation occupies an area covering the base and slopes of the first Dentelles de Montmirail foothills. The villages of Beaumes-de-Venise and Vacqueyras are located to the south and west of Gigondas respectively and enjoy very similar growing conditions. The terroir here is characterized by a hot, dry Mediterranean climate and by the combination of limestone soils (on the Montmirail slopes to the east) and rocky, sandy, free-draining soils (on the flatter, lower-lying land to the north and west)

Domaine Santa Duc Aux Lieux Dits Gigodas

The wines made in the Ventoux appellation are very similar to those of the Côtes du Rhône title and employ much the same combination of grape varieties. The classic southern Rhone red grape varieties of Grenache, Syrah and Mourvèdre are used in the production of most of these wines, with Cinsaut and Carignan also used to a smaller extent. The area does produce some white wines. These are made from Clairette, Bourboulenc and Grenache Blanc, with the occasional use of Roussanne. Quantities of these are far outweighed



by red and rosé wines. Mont Ventoux looks down over the wine-producing areas of the Rhône Valley to the west and Provence to the south and east. On the western slopes and foothills of this iconic mountain, in an area roughly 30 miles (50km) from north to south and covering 51 communes, are the vineyards of the Ventoux appellation. The Côtes du Luberon region lies on its southern border. Wines have been made here since the 1st Century AD and have been consumed (and written about) by popes and kings throughout the centuries. The official Côtes du Ventoux appellation was created just before the harvest of 1973, for red, white and rosé wines. The style of these wines varies according to the combination of grape varieties used and the terroir from which they originate. The style is overall one of lighter, fruit-driven wines, compared with wines from neighboring regions. This reflects the increased altitude and slightly cooler mesoclimates that the Ventoux slopes provide.

Chateau Pesquie Terrasses Blanc Rhone France

On the pallet honey, orange, mango, kiwi, tangerine, herbal tea, wild flower, almond, apple, pear, crisp acid, apple, lemon, honeysuckle, spice, floral, citrus, pear, banana and peach.

France: Entre Deux Mers (Between Left and Right Bank Bordeaux)

In light of the left and right bank appellations, the Entre-deux-Mers is undeniably the 'lesser know area' of Bordeaux. Its name comes from the two rivers which surround it, the Dordogne to the north and the Gironde to the south. This region produces, in terms of red wines, a majority of Bordeaux wines or under the Premières Côtes de Bordeaux appellation, whereas the white wines are produced with the Entre-deux-Mers appellation, which causes much confusion, as consumers can tend to think that the area solely produces white wines! The south of the appellation is specialized in sweet wines (Loupiac, Sainte-Croix du Mont et Cadillac). As far as terroir is concerned, there is great diversity, with limestone (particularly towards the Dordogne), clay-rich areas (to the north-west of the region), and gravelly areas, in the Graves de Vayres appellation to the north of the Entre-deux-Mers.

Crémant de Bordeaux is the regional appellation for white and rosé methode traditionelle sparkling wines from the Bordeaux wine region of south-western France. More than 500 parishes are covered by the Crémant de Bordeaux appellation, making it one of the largest in France in terms of geographical area. However, only 670 hectares (1655 acres) of vineyards are currently devoted to producing these wines. The classic Bordeaux grape varieties prevail, with the sparkling wines being made from the same varieties as the still wines. These include the white varieties Sauvignon Blanc, Semillon and Muscadelle and the red grapes Cabernet Franc, Cabernet Sauvignon, Carmenère, Malbec, Merlot and Petit Verdot. A good Crémant de Bordeaux has tight, persistent effervescence (a defining advantage of methode traditionelle wines over those made by other techniques, such as the Charmat process) and a complex, nutty, gently honeyed nose. The use of Semillon is responsible for more floral, grassy aromas than those found in champagne and



this is emphasized in those wines that are subjected to extended lees contact beyond the minumum legal requirement for Crémant de Bordeaux wines, which must not be disgorged for at least nine months after their first bottling.

France: Languedoc-Roussillon

Languedoc-Roussillon (often called "the Languedoc") is a historical coastal region in southern France, extending from Provence to the Pyrenees Mountains and the border with Spain. It's now part of Occitanie. The area is a major wine producer, with Vin de Pays d'Oc and sparkling Crémant de Limoux among its best-known varieties. The majority of Languedoc's wines are red blends, but rosé and still white wines are produced here, as are sparkling wines made in the traditional method, a technique made famous because of its association with Champagne but one that's believed to have been discovered in Languedoc's Limoux area. Documents dating to 1544 support this claim.



There are also four Languedoc sweet wine appellations, which produce vins doux naturels from the Muscat variety. Although the major share of Langeudoc's production is still made up of IGP wines, today there are 23 AOCs in the region, representing about 16 percent of its total production. There are 10 Sub-Regional Appellations, 5 Village Appellations, 4 Sweet Wine Appellations, 3 Sparkling Wine Appellations, 11 Regional Designations, and 3 Sub-Regional Designations.

Domaine Lafage, Narassa, Rhone Red Blend, Côtes Catalanes, Languedoc Roussillon, France 14 / 40 70% Grenache, 30 % Syrah. the deep purple 2018 Narassa gives up a gorgeous bouquet of blueberries, kirsch liqueur, smoked game, violets, and lavender. It's rich, medium to full-bodied, beautifully concentrated, and has a great finish.

Domaine de Nizas, Languedoc Le Clos 2018

(Syrah, Mourvédre, Granache) A supple yet concentrated red, with underpinnings of dried herb and black tea flanking the black cherry and current notes. Spice and licorice elements detail the moderately tannic finish.

Domaine Lafage Novellum Chardonnay, Languedoc Roussillon, France

Côté Est, as the name suggests, comes from vineyards planted on the gentle slopes facing the Mediterranean just a few kilometers inland from the sea. Benefiting from the thermal breezes that refresh these vineyards every afternoon in the summer — which preserves a high level of natural acidity in the grapes. Floral and aromatic, it is an excellent example of the open and friendly whites you can find all along the Catalan coast from Perpignan to the Penedès.

Domaing Lafage Miraflors Rose Languedoc Roussillon, France (1.5L Magnum)

The terroir and the wines of Banyuls are expressed through a king grape variety: Grenache.

Cremant de Limoux is an AOC for sparkling wines produced around the city of Limoux in the Languedoc in southwestern France. The region has a long history of producing sparkling wines that dates as far back as the early 1500s. The main grape of the region is Mauzac, which produces a rustic wine with a characteristic, pithy, apple-peel flavor. Cremant de Limoux; however, relies more heavily on Chenin Blanc and Chardonnay as is more typical of the Loire. Together these two grapes cannot comprise more than 90% of the blend, with Chenin having to make up between 20-and 40%. Mauzac and Pinot Noir round out the blend.

France: Loire Valley

Loire Valley: includes the French wine regions situated along the Loire River from the Muscadet region near the city of Nantes on the Atlantic coast to the region of Sancerre and Pouilly-Fumé just southeast of the city of Orléans in north central France. In between are the regions of Anjou wine, Saumur, Bourgueil, Chinon, and Vouvray. The Loire Valley itself follows the river through the Loire province to the river's origins in the Cévennes but the majority of the wine production takes place in the regions noted above. The area includes 87 appellations under the Appellation d'origine contrôlée (AOC), Vin Délimité de Qualité Superieure (VDQS) and Vin de pays systems. While the majority of production is white wine from the Chenin blanc, Sauvignon blanc and Mel-



on de Bourgogne grapes, there are red wines made (especially around the Chinon region) from Cabernet franc. In addition to still wines, rosé, sparkling and dessert wines are also produced. With Crémant production throughout the Loire, it is the second largest sparkling wine producer in France after Champagne. Among these different wine styles, Loire wines tend to exhibit characteristic fruitiness with fresh, crisp flavors-especially in their youth. The Loire Valley has a long history of winemaking dating back to the 1st century. In the High Middle Ages, the wines of the Loire Valley were the most esteemed wines in England and France, even more prized than those from Bordeaux.

Domaine Foucher-Lebrun, Pouilly-Fumé La Vigne aux Sandres

Nice old world Sauvignon Blanc of pale transparent yellow color. It offers citrus aromas of grapefruit and lemon with a touch of white flowers, fresh grass and a hint of honey. The palate is one of softness with a good acidity mixed with citrus flavors. The finish is marked by a very nice minerality and good persistence on the palate.

Vourvay and Touraine: The region around Vouvray, Montlouis-sur-Loire and Touraine has some of the most diverse plantings of all the Loire region and makes a wide variety of white, red and rosé wines. For white wines the main grape is Chenin blanc but Sauvignon blanc and (to a smaller extent) Chardonnay is also planted. For red wines the main grape is Cabernet franc with some smaller plantings of Cabernet Sauvignon, Gamay and Malbec. The rosé wines are made from an assortment of Gamay, Pineau d'aunis, Pinot gris and Pinot noir. The villages of Vouvray and Montlouis are the largest appellations in the region and make only white wines from Chenin blanc. The wines can vary in sweetness from bone dry (often appearing as sec on the wine label) to very sweet moelleux wines that are often infected by noble rot For years the Touraine region would compete with the Beaujolais region for the release of an early bottling of Gamay that would rival the Beaujolais nouveau.



While the competition is not so much of a focal point now, there are still some producers who release early bottlings of the wine around the same time as Beaujolais. The soil around the Touraine area is a variety of limestone with excellent drainage that is known as tuffeau which is the same material used to build many of the famous Loire Valley Châteaux.

Sauvion Vouvray, Chenin Blanc (Loire Valley, France)

France: Loire Valley

Saumur-Champigny: A red wine appellation of Saumur in the central Loire Valley wine region of France. Created in December 1957, this location-specific title was introduced as a complement to the Saumur Rouge appellation (created at the same time and under the same decree). Saumur-Champigny wines are made predominantly from Cabernet Franc, with a permitted (if rarely used) addition of up to 15 percent Cabernet Sauvignon and/or Pineau d'Aunis (sometimes called "Chenin Noir" here). The wines are typically light or medium-bodied, and characterized by crisp acidity and forward, slightly spicy, berry fruit flavors.



Thierry Germain Saumur Champigny Franc De Pied (Cabernet Franc) Loire, France

(100% Cabernet Franc). Warm, intense and with super ripe yet refined and precise dark fruit, spicy toast and flint aromas open the 2019 Saumur Champigny Franc de Pied. Fermented with whole clusters, the fruit is generous and elegant on nose and palate, pure and refined but rich and aromatic. This is a full-bodied and generous but finessed and fresh red with a marvelous texture and perfectly balanced fruit. The wine is superb with a silky texture and refreshing grip which is unique, due to the antique vines and the whole-cluster fermentation, a method that is quite rare in Saumur. This Franc de Pied is fabulous, pure, fresh, and crunchy and reminds me of finest Austrian Blaufränkisch.

Sancerre: Known for its exceptional Sauvignon Blanc wines, Sancerre is found in some of the world's best restaurants and praised by many of the top wine experts. Although Sancerre is most famous for its white wine, the appellation also produces high quality red and rosé using Pinot Noir grapes. East of Bourges, the Sancerre appellation is located along the left bank of the Loire River, stretching across 3,000 hectares (7,413 acres).north east of Bourges, and extend over the communes of Bannay, Bué, Crézancy, Menetou-Ratel, Ménétréol, Montigny, Saint-Satur, Sainte Gemme, Sancerre including the hamlets of Amigny and Chavignol), Sury en Vaux (incl. Maimbray), Thauvenay, Veaugues, Verdigny, and Vinon.



Domaine Hubert Brochard Sancerre le cul de Beaujeu Loire France

100% Sauvignon Blanc. This wine comes from a steep, southeast-facing vineyard close to the castle of Beaujeu. Particularly rich, it offers tropical fruits that show strongly through the acidity. There is an urgency to the texture, taut and still young. The wine proves the aging ability of fine Sancerre.


France: Provence

Provence (Provençal) wine comes from the French wine-producing region of Provence in southeast France. The Romans called the area provincia nostra ("our province"), giving the region its name. Just south of the Alps, it was the first Roman province outside Italy. Wine has been made in this region for at least 2,600 years, ever since the ancient Greeks founded the city of Marseille in 600 BC. Throughout the region's history, viticulture and winemaking have been influenced by the cultures that have been present in Provence, which include the Ancient Greeks, Romans, Gauls, Catalans and Savoyards. These diverse groups introduced a large variety of grapes to the region, including grape varieties of Greek and Roman origin as well



as Spanish, Italian and traditional French wine grapes. Today the region is known predominantly for its rosé wine, though wine critics such as Tom Stevenson believe that region's best wines are the spicy, full-flavoured red wines. The Côtes de Provence is the largest AOC followed by the Coteaux d'Aix-en-Provence. The Bandol region near Toulon is one of the more internationally recognized Provençal wine regions.

Côtes de Provence AOC The Côtes de Provence AOC is a large noncontiguous wine region that covers over 85 communes in the eastern region of Provence. The boundaries of the region extend from the alpine hills near Draguignan to the coast of Saint-Tropez. The noncontiguous parts of the region include land southeast of the Palette AOC and on the outskirts of the Bandol and Cassis wine area. The mountainous terrain near Villars-sur-Var in the northeast part of the area includes vineyards that can label their wine as Côtes de Provence. The region accounts for nearly 75% of all the wine production in Provence with rosé accounting for around 80% of the production. While the number is rising, about 15% of wine production is red wine with the



remaining 5% white. The main grape varieties are Carignan, Cinsaut, Grenache, Mourvèdre and Tibouren with an increase in the use of Cabernet Sauvignon and Syrah.

Vanderpump Rosé (Cotes de Provence, France)

France: Provence

Coteaux d'Aix-en-Provence and Les Baux-de-**Provence** The Coteaux d'Aix-en-Provence AOC is the second largest Provençal wine appellation, covering over 50 communes in the west and northwestern regions of Provence. The area comprises the city of Aix-en-Provence and surrounding communes. Nearly 60% of the production is red wine, followed by 35% rosé and 5% white wine. The major grape includeGrenache. varieties Cinsaut Mourvèdre, and Cabernet Sauvignon was introduced to the region in the 1960s. The cuttings came from the Bordeaux estate of Château La Lagune. The main white wine grapes of the Coteaux d'Aix-en-Provence include Bourboulenc, Clairette, Grenache blanc, Chardonnay, Sauvignon blanc and Semillon. Within the Coteaux d'Aix-en-Provence is the smaller Les Baux-de-Provence AOC which was granted AOC status in 1995. The climate of the region is very hot with the surrounding valley known as the Val d'Enfer (Valley of Hell). Vineyards are centered



around the hilltop village of the Les Baux-de-Provence and red grape varieties account for around 80%. with some white wine and a dry rosé. The leading grape varieties are Grenache, Mourvèdre and Syrah. The AOC rule requires that no two varieties can compose more than 90% of the blend with Carignan, Cinsaut and Counoise permitted but at a maximize usage of 30%. The use of Cabernet Sauvignon is growing in prevalence but is limited to composing no more than 20% of the blend. The rosés of Les Baux-de-Provence are composed of a minimum 60% of Cinsaut, Grenache and Syrah with similar requirements to the AOC red wine that no two grapes varieties compose more than 90% of the blend. Baux-de-Provence was the first AOC to require all vineyards to be farmed biodynamically. The rule was adopted as producers had already converted to organic viticulture, eliminating the use of chemicals that could easily dispersed from the vines by the strong Mistral wind.

Maison Saint AIX, Rosé Coteaux d'Aix-en-Provence 2019

Peppery Grenache brings out the richness. Raspberry flavors and ripe acidity are full and generous. Deliciously refreshing.

France: Jura

a small wine region Jura isinern France which is responsible for some traditional and highly idiosyncratic wine styles. It is close to, but quite distinct from the Swiss Jura. The region is sandwiched between Burgundy in the west and Switzerland in the east. It is characterized by a landscape of wooded hillsides and the twisting topography of the Jura Mountains. Five main grape varieties used in the region's wines - three traditional and two more-modern imports. The first of the local varieties is Poulsard (or Ploussard as it is known in the communes of Arbois and Pupillin), a red grape which accounts for about one-fifth of the region's plantings. Poulsard is used mostly in dry reds, but also in sparkling rose



wines. Trousseau, the other local red variety, requires high sunshine levels to mature properly and covers only the warmest five percent of Jura's vineyards. It is grown mostly around Arbois, where it produces a small quantity of varietal wines. White Savagnin (known locally as Nature) is used in all of the region's appellations. It is responsible for the idiosyncratic vins jaunes ('yellow wines'). These are long-lived, bone dry wines aged in barrels under a layer of flor/yeast known as le voile. Vins jaunes may be made under the the Arbois (including Arbois-Pupillin), L'Étoile and Côtes du Jura titles appellations. However they are at their best under the more exclusive Château Chalon title. Along with its unique vin jaune, Jura has been known traditionally for its sweet vin de paille made from dried grapes. They are produced under the same appellations, Château Chalon excepted.

Francois Montand Ice Edition Demi-Sec Sparkling Wine Jura France NV

Germany

Mosel AVA: Mosel is the most famous of Germany's 13 official wine regions, and also the third largest in terms of production. As with many German regions, it is most associated with a range of wine styles made from the Riesling grape variety, but Müller-Thurgau is also widely planted. The Mosel has a very cool, northern continental climate, and such slopes are very effective in optimizing the vines' exposure to sun, facilitating the ripening of the grapes. A long growing season helps develop the intense flavors in the Riesling grapes while keeping potential alcohol levels low. One disadvantage of such steep vineyard sites is that they are inaccessible to machinery, meaning as much as seven times the amount of manual labor is required to tend them, compared to level vineyards.

Pfalz AVA: For over 85 uninterrupted kilometers, Pfalz's vineyards sweep across this remarkably pretty, peaceful land, linking the 130 wine towns of the region between Bockenheim and Schweigen on the border with Alsace. Weinstraße. The main focus of the winegrowers in the cultivation area limited and protected by the Pfälzerwald forest, is on classic grape varieties, especially Riesling. The king of white wines has become the undisputed leader in the Pfalz with nearly 6,000 hectares cultivated. Pinot Blanc and Pinot Gris have also been on the rise with now over 3,000 hectares planted. In addition, Silvaner, Müller-Thurgau, Gewürztraminer, Kerner and Morio-Muskat belong to the diverse



range of white wines in the Pfalz as well as the international varieties Chardonnay and Sauvignon Blanc. The red wines are becoming increasingly important. There is lively, fresh Weißherbst from the Portugieser grape, fruity Pinot Noir and as a special Pfalz success story, Dornfelder, which has been creating a sensation for several years. The Pfalz the largest red wine region in Germany.

Germany

Rheinhessen AVA: Rheinhessen is Germany's largest region for producing the quality wines of the Qualitätswein bestimmter Anbaugebiete (QbA) and Prädikatswein designations, with roughly 26,500 hectares (65,000 acres) of vineyards as of 2014. Many of its most significant viticultural areas are favorably influenced by the Rhine river, which runs along its north and eastern borders. The Rhine, along with the Nahe river to the west and the Haardt mountains to its south, form a natural border. Rheinhessen covers an area south of Rheingau, north of Pfalz and east of Nahe, and is located within the Rhineland-Palatinate federal state. The region has been cultivating grapes for wine production at least since ancient Roman occupation. It's also the home to the oldest surviving records of a German vineyard. Named Glöck,



the vineyard was included in a deed for a church and vineyards gifted by Carloman – a duke of the Franks of the Carolingian family and the uncle of the first Holy Roman Emperor, Charlemagne – to the diocese of Würzburg in 742. Within a century, dozens of villages were cultivating grapes throughout Rheinhessen. The region predominantly produces white wine, in-line with the majority of German wine production, however it is known for growing relatively diverse range of grape varieties. Müller-Thurgau has been the most planted variety for much of Rheinhessen's modern history, however Riesling has gained in prominence and over the last half-decade the two grapes have come to occupy a similar share of the land under vine, roughly 16 percent each. Dornfelder, the most widely planted red, accounts for 13 percent of the land under vine, with other prominent varieties include Silvaner, Grauburgunder (Pinot Gris) and Spätburgunder (Pinot Noir). Despite the diversity, Riesling and Spätburgunder are the only varieties permitted in the VDP Grosse Lagen wines of Rheinhessen.

Greece

Greece is one of the oldest wine-producing regions in the world and among the first wine-producing territories in Europe. The earliest evidence of Greek wine has been dated to 6,500 years ago^{[1][2]} where wine was produced on a household or communal basis. In ancient times, as trade in wine became extensive, it was transported from end to end of the Mediterranean; Greek wine had especially high prestige in Italy under the Roman Empire. In the medieval period, wines exported from Crete, Monemvasia and other Greek ports fetched high prices in northern Europe.

Peloponnese: There are eight main sub-regions in the Peloponnese wine region, namely, Argolis, Arcadia, Achaia, Ilia, Corinthia, Laconia, Messinia, and Kefalonia. Along those, the wine appellations are organized into 24 P.G.I and 10 P.D.O, whereas Nemea is the most famous one, meaning "Hercules' blood"



Mantinia: is a Greek designation withing the Peloponnese that produces light and aromatic white wines from Moschofilero—an indigenous pinkskinned Greek grape. The region is located on the eastern side of the Peloponnese, an area characterized by its cool microclimate.

Greece

Greek Macedonia (Makedonia) is an expansive region in northern Greece. It is bordered by the Republic of North Macedonia, Albania and Bulgaria to the north and the Aegean Sea in the south. The vineyards in the mountainous region are extensively planted to Xynomavro, along with Roditis, Limnio and the moreinternational Cabernet Sauvignon grape variety. Macedonian red wines are noted for their firm tannins and big flavors, and the best examples are among Greece's most-sought-after reds.



Goumenissa: is one of northern Macedonia's lesser-known appellations, located about 50 kilometers (30 mi) northwest of Thessaloniki. The area's vineyards, sitting on the western slopes of Mount Paikos near the small town of Goumenissa, are planted extensively to the Xynomavro and Negoska grape varieties. The appellation covers red wine made from a blend of these two varieties, which are more rustic and fruit-driven in comparison to neighboring regions.



Ktima Gerovassiliou, Malagousia Epanomi Macedonia Greece

(100% Malagousia) This wine has a brilliant straw color with greenish shades and an aroma of matured fruit such as pear, mango and citrus. On the palate flavors of ruby red grapefruit, granite, ripe yellow peach and a touch of lemon peel enhance the appealing mouthfeel in this well-cut, medium-bodied white. Lithe and lingering on the minerally finish.

Hungary

One hundred years ago, Hungary was one of the most important wine producers in Europe. Every royal court in Europe clinked glasses filled with precious gold Tokaji wine, while other lush Hungarian whites and reds were lauded and enjoyed throughout Europe. So why don't we see more Hungarian wine today? Cue the aggressive assault of phylloxera in the 1880's, two world wars, and forty years of communist collectivization and we begin to get our answer. Fortunately, Hungary is bouncing back. Countless small estates, replanted and cultivated across the country are turning out beautiful wines—a result of traditional winemaking culture mixed with a modern sensibility. With 22 wine regions growing hundreds of varietals, the country offers a multitude of great wines to explore.

Tokaj: Tokaj is the gold standard of the Hungarian wine regions. It is Hungary's most famous wine region, the oldest classified wine region in the world, a Unesco World Heritage Site, and home to the world's first noble rot wine—the sweet golden Tokaji Aszú ("toe-kye aszoo"). Named after the village of Tokaj, the region is made up of 28 towns scattered along rolling hills and nestled between two rivers,



the Tisza and the Bodrog. The rivers create a special microclimate in the area with high levels of moisture in the air, offset by wind and abundant sunshine. This creates optimal conditions for botrytized wines.

Oremus Tokaji Late Harvest (Hungary) 500ml (3oz pour)

Disznókö is a hundred-year-old winery in the Tokaj region, a world-renowned area that is known for its extraordinary, sweet wines made with clusters affected by Botrytis cinerea. The estate also produces dry wines from its native varieties like this Disznókö Tokaji Dry Furmint, a single-variety wine made with the town's flagship grape: the Furmint, which in this case comes from plots with clay-volcanic soils that give it a subtle mineral touch that perfectly expresses the freshness of the terroir. Aromas of white fruits and grapefruits on the nose. On the palate it is fresh and fruity with flavors reminiscent of exotic fruits, pears and quinces accompanied by a s ubtle mineral and saline hue that lingers through the finish. A fresh and elegant wine.

Israel

Over the last twenty years, the Israeli wine industry has grown tremendously and today there are around 300 wineries of different sizes in all areas of Israel and the Israeli-occupied territories of the Golan Heights and the West Bank. Israeli wine is produced in five regions, including portions of the Israeli-occupied territories: Galilee (which includes the subregions of the Israeli-occupied Golan Heights, Upper Galilee and Lower Galilee); the Samson region, located between the southern West Bank and the Coastal Plain; the Negev desert region; the Israeli-occupied



West Bank, and the Sharon plain located near the Mediterranean coast and just south of Haifa. A primary concern in Israeli wine production is maintaining acid levels to balance the naturally high sugars that the warm climate of the region produces. Vineyards at higher elevations, as opposed to the lower coastal plains, have more consistently produced wines with the necessary acid balance. Cabernet Sauvignon has shown the greatest aging potential thus far. The smooth texture and ripe tannins of Israeli Merlot has increased that wine's popularity in the market. Chardonnay grown in Israel has shown itself to be highly reflective of terroir and reflective of the particular characteristics of vineyard soils. It is also the primary grape used in Israeli sparkling wine production made according to the methode champenoise.

Gates of Jerusalem Reserve Chardonnay Judean Hills Israel

Italy— Friûl Vignesie Julie

Friuli Venezia Giulia is a northeast Italian region bordering Austria, Slovenia and the Adriatic Sea. It's home to the sharp-peaked Dolomite Mountains and vineyards producing white wines. Trieste, the capital, was once part of the 19th-century Austro-Hungarian Empire. Its famous sights include the old quarter, the waterfront Piazza dell'Unità d' Italia square and Castello di Miramare, a former royal residence. The name used to be hyphenated as Friuli-Venezia Giulia until 2001. The region is called Friûl Vignesie Julie in Friulian, Furlanija



Julijska krajina in Slovene and Friaul Julisch Venetien in German, three languages spoken in the region. The city of Venice ("Venezia") is not in this region, despite the name. The region is divided in as many as 10 DOC and 4 DOCG areas that grow some thirty different wine varieties, often in small quantities.

Jermann Vintage Tunina White Blend Friuli-Venezia Giulia, Italy

75 (Sauvignon Blanc, Chardonnay, Ribolla Gialla, Malvasia and Picolit) One of Friuli's most iconic wines, this racy, elegant white opens with enticing scents of white spring flowers, sliced pears, green apples, white peaches, and lychee fruit. Full-bodied and very reserved, but the complexity and beauty here are so apparent delivering ripe pear, peach, nectarine, and lemon drop candy alongside a mineral vein and crisp acidity.

Colli Orientali del Friuli (Co-lli Oryen-tally) East of Udine (oo-den-eh) is where winemaking dates back to Roman times. Today, you can find international and local varieties growing side-by-side including Sauvignon Blanc, Chardonnay, and Pinot Grigio. Vines do very well when planted on the Colli (aka hills) which are protected by the Alps to the North and exposed to gentle sea breezes to the South. White wines of Colli Orientali del Friuli feature scents of white flowers and ripe apples. On the palate you'll taste lots of stone fruit and a long tingly finish. Despite the prevalence of international varieties in Colli Orientali, it's the local varieties that are worthy of interest.



Borgo Conventi, Pinot Grigio Colli Orientali del Friuli (Friuli-Venezia Giulia, Italy) Straw yellow in color, with coppery highlights. On the nose it is fragrant, layered and concentrated with notes of ripe pear and spring flowers it is elegant and supple with avory characteristics.

Zaglia Giorgio Z, Pinot Grigio (Friuli, Italy)

Reminiscent of acacia blossom. Very refined taste, it is dry and full bodied with pleasing bitterness.... perfect for pairing with gourmet foods.

Italy: Lombardy

Lombardy, located in north-central Italy, is a wine region that is primarily known for its sparkling wines from Franciacorta and Oltrepo-Pavese. Lombardy tends to have a cool, continental climate. The major distinguishing geographic features are the Alps in the north and the Po River, which cuts through Oltrepo-Pavese. To the west is Piedmont, to the south is Emilia-Romagna, and to the east is Trentino-Alto Adige and Veneto.



Lugana: A picturesque, white wine-specific viticultural region in northern Italy. The vineyard area straddles the regional border between Lombardy in the west and Veneto in the east. It sits at the southern end of Lake Garda, the vines providing a relatively new addition to the landscape of fishing villages and castle-topped towns. The Verdicchio grape variety (aka Trebbiano di Lugana) is the essential ingredient in the area's bianco (white) wines. It thrives in the zone's calcareous clay soils, rich in mineral salts which help the fruit to reach high levels of ripeness and organoleptic complexity. All Lugana wines must comprise at least 90% of this variety, and are often



praised for their balance, structure and fragrance (similar in that of Soave Classico). They are also characterized by their freshness gained from the soil characteristics, fruit concentration, underlying floral and spice notes, and delicate acidity. As well as being renowned for its fruity whites, Lugana is noted for its intensely colored chiaretto wine, which can be made as either a pale red or dark rose, using Groppello, Marzemino, Sangiovese and Barbera grapes.

Zenato, Lugana San Benedetto Italy

Italy: Lombardy

Oltrepò Pavese: The Oltrepò Pavese region is responsible for more the half of all wine produced in the Lombardy region as well as two-thirds of its DOC-designated wines. This region along the Po Valley was once a part of the Piedmont but has

always had Milan as its primary market. Today it produces a DOCG sparkling wine with its Pinot nero (Pinot noir) grapes and a rose sparkling wine denominated Cruase. In addition to sparkling wines, the Oltrepò Pavese also produces red wines from the Pinot nero, Barbera, Croatina, Uva Rara and Vespolina. There are some small plantings of Cabernet Sauvignon that are starting to appear as varietal wines. The white wines of the region are made from Riesling Italico Welschriesling), Riesling (Riesling Reano), Chardonnay, Cortese, Malvasia, Moscato, Pinot grigio and Sauvignon blanc. The Pinot nero grape is



also vinified as a rose and as a white, non-sparkling wine in addition to being made as a standard red wine. The sparkling wines of the region are made in several styles. The wines labeled metodo classico are made according to the méthode champenoise of the Champagne region. The wines are composed primarily of Pinot nero with up to a 30% blend of Chardonnay, Pinot bianco and Pinot grigio. Slightly sparkling frizzante styles are made from several of the region's red and white wine grapes including the dry Buttafuoco style and the semi-sweet Sangue di Giuda (meaning Judas' blood) both made from the Croatina grape, known locally as Bonarda. The Moscato grape is also made into a frizzante style as well as liquoroso fortified wine & passito dessert wine.

Calatroni Sangue Di Giuda, dell'Oltropo(Pavese, Italy)

Franciacorta: Franciacorta lies in the heart of Italy's Lombardi region. Lombardy lies south of the Swiss border at the foot of the Alps. Milan is the financial, fashion and cultural hub of this northern part of Italy and just to the north is picturesque Lake Cuomo. Lake Iseo, to the northeast of Milan, is smaller than Lake Cuomo and not as well known, yet charming and impossibly pretty. The Franciacorta wine region cozies up against the southern shores of Lake Iseo and is characterized by rolling hills dotted



with stone villages and historic monasteries. This small region, only 77 square miles with just under 8,000 planted acres, is defined by weather mitigated by Lake Iseo, complex soils deposited by glaciers and many small producers, the majority of whom farm organically. And all Franciacorta is sparkling wine made in the traditional method, called metodo classico in Italy. Franciacorta describes the region, the winemaking and the wine.

Italy: Piedmont

Piedmont (Piemonte) enjoys an unrivaled seat among the world's very finest wine regions. Located in northwest Italy it is the home of more DOCG wines than any other Italian region, among them such well known and respected names as Barolo, Barbaresco, and Barbera d'Asti. Although famous for its austere, tannic, and floral red wines made from Nebbiolo, Piedmont's greatest success story in the past decade has been sweet, white, sparkling Moscato d'Asti. Piedmont sits, as its name suggests, at the foot of the Western Alps, which encircle its northern and western sides and forms its naturally formidable border with Provence, France. To its southeast lie the northernmost Apennine Mountains. These low coastal hills divide Piedmont from its long, thin neighbor Liguria, and the Mediterranean beyond.



Gavi Gavi is in fact a small town in the North-Western part of Italy, in the Piedmont region, one of the most famous wine-growing regions of Italy, the one that also produces the Astis, the Barolos and the Barbarescos. But rather than being quite high up inland towards the Alps, the 11 towns around Gavi that form the Gavi appellation area, are located at the Southern end of Piedmont, bordering the Coastal region of Liguria. Gavi not only has influences from the Alps mountain ranges, but also cooling influences from the Mediterranean, especially during summer. Gavi whites are made from an Italian white grape variety called Cortese-di-Gavi which is pretty much unique to this area.

Italy: Piedmont

Montferrat (UK: /,montfəˈræt/,[1] US: /-ˈrɑːt/;Italian: - Monferrato [momferˈraːto]; Piedmontese: Monfrà [munˈfra]; Latin: Mons Ferratus) is part of the region of Piedmont in orthern Italy. It comprises roughly (and its extent has varied over time) the modern provinces of Alessandria and Asti. The territory is cut in two by the river Tanaro. The northern part (the Basso Monferrato, "Low Montferrat"), which lies between that river and the Po, is an area of rolling hills and plains. The southern part (the Alto Monferrato)



area of rolling hills and plains. The southern part (the Alto Monferrato, "High Montferrat") rises from the banks of the Tanaro into the mountains of the Apennines and the water divide between Piedmont and Liguria.

Asti is the name of a province, a town and a wine – all to be found in Piedmont, north-western Italy. The suffix "d'Asti" appears in the names of several wines from the Asti area, including Barbera d'Asti, Dolcetto d'Asti and of course the famous Moscato d'Asti. When used alone (just 'Asti') on a wine label, it indicates the wine formerly known as Asti Spumante – a refreshing, slightly sweet, sparkling white wine made from Moscato grapes. In late 1993, Asti Spumante was promoted to the top-level DOCG classification, at which point the "spumante" was officially dropped. Almost invariably, these other wines are simply the sparkling version of their appellation's main style.

Barbaresco This wine region is ranked as one of the greatest in Italy. Along with Barolo, Barbaresco produces world class wines from the Nebbiolo grape in the Piedmont region. The vineyards around the town of Barbaresco make up for 45% of Barbaresco production . Wines from this area tend to be relatively light in color and body well structured and aromatic.



Massimo Rivetti Barbaresco 'Froi' Barbaresco, Piedmont, Italy

100% Nebbiolo. A Classic dry Barbaresco. Fragrant blue flowers, wild berry, new leather, a hint of clove and an earthy whiff of game shape the nose. Linear and precise, the focused palate delivers dried black cherry, oriental spices, licorice, tobacco, vanilla and star anise alongside fine-grained tannins and bright acidity.

Rivetti Massimo Barbaresco, Piedmont, Italy

100% Nebbiolo. Nebbiolo ripens earlier in Barbaresco than in Barolo, primarily due to the vineyards' proximity to the Tanaro River and lower elevations. While the wines here are still powerful, Barbaresco expresses a more feminine side of Nebbiolo, often with softer tannins, delicate fruit, and an elegant perfume. Aromas of red berry, mint, menthol, and baking spice slowly take shape in the glass. On the palate, notes of anise, chopped herb and black pepper add depth to the cherry-raspberry core. Firm, fine-grained tannins and fresh acidity provide the framework.

Barolo is a traditional hillside village in the rolling hills of Piedmont, northwestern Italy. The vineyards and cantine (wineries) there have long been famous for producing some of Italy's very finest red wines. The region's signature grape variety, Nebbiolo is the sole variety permitted for the wine which takes the village's name. Fragrant, tannic Barolo wine is so revered that it was one of just three wines awarded DOCG status on the day that the classification was introduced in July 1980. (The other two were Brunello di Montalcino and Vino Nobile di Montepulciano).



Michele Chiarlo Barolo Tortoniano, Barolo Piedmont Italy

This vintage flaunts its most elegant side, with fine tannins and soft fruity fiber that remains everlasting and pure.

Italy: Puglia / Sardinia

The Puglian wine region is divided into three subregions: Foggia in the north, Bari and Taranto in the center, and Brindisi and Lecce in the south. After Veneto, Puglia is tied with Sicily as the second biggest wine region in Italy. The Puglia area is mostly home to grape growers, rather than wine producers. If you want fruit-forward, ripe, red wine for a good price, look no further than Puglia. Some of the best values in Italian wine come from this sunny, dry region. Most Puglia wine is red, full-bodied and will pair well with a wide variety of foods. Producers in Puglia have



focused on making great red wines and local grapes like Negroamaro, Primitivo, and Bombino Nero make for delicious drinking.

Sardinia

Sulcis: Sulcis is a coastal zone around the modern-day Sant'Antioco, a city founded by the Phoenicians and known then by the name Solki, which eventually became Sulcis. It includes the island of Sant-Antioco, Italy's fourth-largest island (after Sicily, Elba and Sardinia itself), which is connected to the mainland by a causeway and bridge. A respectable number of vines are grown on the island, particularly in the northeast corner between Sant-Antioco and Calasetta towns. The northern end of the Gulf of Palmas separates the island from the Sardinian mainland and provides a cooling influence for Sardinia's most southerly vines. At a latitude of 38



degrees north, this is one of the more equatorial viticultural regions in Europe, parallel with Murcia in southern Spain, Alentejo in Portugal and Calabria on the Italian mainland.

Italy: Sicily

The Greeks, Phoenicians, Arabs and Italians have all held sway over Sicily. Though the Greeks brought their advanced viticulture techniques, Sicilians have been making wine since 4000 BC. Its dry, warm climate features regular sunshine and moderate rainfall that suits wine production. Arid conditions reduce the chance of rot and mildew, especially in areas kissed with coastal breezes. This makes Sicily a prime candidate for organic farming. Olives, citrus and grains drive the agricultural sector beyond wine. In the past, however, farmers opted for higher yields, which turned Sicily into a bulk wine center. They distributed to mainland Europe to boost thin wines, as well as to China and India, who imported concentrated Sicilian must to sweeten foods. Heritage regions like Marsala did put Sicilian wine on the map. Wine traditions in each of the island's regions, from Vittoria to Mount Etna, have remained strong. In the 1980s, a resurgence in interest brought improvements in viticulture and winemaking. Today, Sicily turns out some of the most exciting labels in Italy.

Patelleria: Pantelleria is a small island nestled in the middle of the Mediterranean, sixty miles southwest of Sicily and thirty miles east of Tunisia. The fortunate few who have heard of this best-kept secret may know it through the island's sweet, luscious Passito wines made from sun-dried Muscat grapes. "Passito" refers to the technique of drying, or raisining, berries on or off the vine. Pantelleria's exceptionally hot, and generally dry, climate certainly favor this technique, which effectively concentrates sugars in the berries through desiccation, a style further aided by the island's sometimes strong winds that blow from the North African coast.

Italy: Trentino-Alto Adige region

Trentino is an autonomous province in the far north of Italy, bordering Lombardy to the west and Veneto to the south and east. The province forms the southern half of the Trentino-Alto Adige region. The other half is Alto Adige (Südtirol to its largely German speaking population). Some 70 percent of the land lies above 1000 meters (3000 feet), with 20 percent above 2000m; 90 peaks exceed 3000m. The Dolomite Alps make up these highlands. Vineyards are planted in the lower 10 percent of the region. Still, in some areas the vines sit up to 900 meters above sea level, and are found throughout Trentino. The peaks and ridges bring protection from the elements, casting a rain shadow over the valley. They also channel warm air currents through it as the land heats up and cools down over the course of the day. This reliable mountain breeze keeps vineyards free from undesirable rot and fungal diseases.



Roscato Moscato, Travenezie,

Straw yellow in color with varied notes of candied citrus, ripe fruit, & white flowers. Fresh taste & pleasantly fruity aftertaste.

Santa Margherita Sparkling Rose Brut (Trentino-Alto Adige, Italy)

Peter Zemmer Pinot Grigio, Trentino-Alto Adige, Italy

This wine hails from estate vineyards in the Cortina area of the Dolomites in South Tyrol. Shy at first, its aromas take their time to emerge, but once they do, sweet apple and white flowers are particularly lovely, sliced cooked-pear and some pear-blossom aromas. Pear Williams. Steely, salty, and floral nature of the palate encompasses mouthwatering notes of peach. The crisp, full-bodied character dominates with high-toned acidity from mid-palate to finish. What a pretty wine!

Vigneti delle Dolomiti IGT Vigneti delle Dolomiti IGT is an IGT (Indicazione Geografica Tipica) title of the Trentino-Alto Adige region in the far northern reaches of alpine Italy. Its geographical area also spills over into Veneto (specifically the Belluno province), but the vast majority of Vigneti delle Dolomiti wines are from Trentino-Alto Adige. The German-language form of the title is Weinberg

Dolomiten. The IGT title is named after the Dolomite Mountains of which dominates a majority of the topography here. Vineyards are found scattered amoungst the peaks and valleys of the foothills at altitudes of which create cool night time temperatures and warm, sunny days. This diurnal



temperature variation increasing the length of the growing season of which is crucial in this cool climate to allow grapes to achieve full phenolic ripeness.

Cembra Schiava Dolomitit IGT (Trentino, Italy)

Schiava Brigia, Schiava Grossa, Schiava Gentile, Schiava Meranese Grapes. Clearest, lightest red. Nose: cotton candy/bubblegum, strawberry balsamic. Light, tart taste with cranberry, hibiscus, orange peel, slight earthiness. A wonderful 'chilled' accompaniment to appetizers

Italy: Trentino-Alto Adige region

Uberetsch or L'Oltradige is one of the most important wine areas in the Alto Adige-Südtirol region of northern Italy. Together with the Bassa Atesina (Unterland), it forms the Oltradige-Bassa Atesina area. It is a hilly section of the Etschtal in South Tyrol, south-west of Bolzano (Bozen), covering the territory of Alto Adige west of the Adige and south-west of Bolzano at the heart of the Alto Adige-Südtirol region. It is a hilly area, at 200-500 m above sea level, along the slopes of the Coast of Mendola under which the Alto Adige wine road and the Oltradige cycle path run. The region is a known tourist destination, famous for its wines, castles of medieval origin surrounded by vineyards, orchards and the lakes of Monticolo and Caldaro.



Elena Walch, Beyond the Clouds, Alto Adige Bianco Trentino-Alto Adige,

Italy: Umbria

Umbria is located in central Italy surrounded by Tuscany, Lazio and Marche wine regions. Etruscans and Umbrians were the first to plant vines 3,000 years ago. Later, the region was known especially for the white wine Orvieto. The Orvieto still exists today - it is called Trebbiano, Verdello or Canaiolo Bianco - but today Umbria is best known for its characterful red and white wines.



Montefalco The DOC was introduced in 1979 and applies to both red and white wines. The vineyard zone surrounds the communes of Montefalco and Bevagna, south-east of Perugia. This area is steeped in grape-growing and wine-making traditions.



Arnaldo Caprai Sagrantino di Montefalco Collepiano Umbria Italy

100% Sagrantino. Darkly alluring notes of plum and cherry sauce give way to balsamic spices and hints of mocha as the wine blossoms in the glass. Italy: Tuscany

Tuscany: Located in central Italy along the Tyrrhenian coast, Tuscany is home to some of the world's most notable wine regions. Chianti, Brunello di Montalcino and Vino Nobile di Montepulciano are primarily made with Sangiovese grape whereas the Vernaccia grape is the basis of the white Vernaccia di San Gimignano. Tuscany is also known for the dessert wine Vin Santo, made from a variety of the region's grapes. Tuscany has forty-one Denominazioni di origine controllata (DOC) and eleven Denominazioni di Origine Controllata e Garantita (DOCG). In the 1970s a new class of wines known in the trade as "Super Tuscans" emerged. Some producers still



prefer the declassified rankings or to use the Indicazione Geografica Tipica (IGT) classification of Toscana. Tuscany has six sub-categories of IGT wines today.

Chianti: Located in the central region of Tuscany, the Chianti zone is Tuscany's largest classified wine region and produces over eight million cases a year. In addition to producing the well known red Chianti wine, the Chianti zone also produces white, other Rosso reds and Vin Santo. The region is split into two DOCG- Chianti and Chianti Classico. The larger Chianti DOCG zone is further divided in six DOC sub-zones and areas in the western part of the province of Pisa, the Florentine hills north of Chianti Classico in the province of Florence, the Siena hills south of the city in the province of Siena, the province of Arezzo and the area around the communes of Rufina and Pistoia. Chianti Classico: The Chianti Classico zone covers the area between Florence and Siena, which is the original Chianti region, and where some of the best expressions of Chianti wine are produced. The terroir of the Classico zone varies throughout the region depending on the vineyards' altitude, soil type and distance from the Arno River. The soils of the northern communes. such as Greve. are in clay deposits while those in the southern communes, like Gaiole, are harder and stonier. Riserva Chianti is aged for at least 27 months, some of it in oak, and must have a minimum alcohol content of 12.5%. Wines from the Chianti DOCG can carry the name of one of the six sub-zones or just



the Chianti designation. The Chianti Superiore designation refers to wines produced in the provinces of Florence and Siena but not in the Classico zone.

The DOC Bolgheri region is also home to the Super Tuscan wine Ornellaia which was featured in the film Mondovino as well as Tignanello from Marchesi Antinori.

Brunello di Montalcino is a red DOCG Italian wine produced in the vineyards surrounding the town of Montalcino, in the province of Siena, located about 80 km south of Florence in the Tuscany wine region. Brunello, a diminutive of Bruno ("brown"), is the name that was given locally to what was believed to be an individual grape variety grown in Montalcino. In 1879 the Province of Siena's Amphelographic Commission determined, after a few years of con-



trolled experiments, that Sangiovese and Brunello were the same grape variety, and that the former should be its designated name. [1] In Montalcino the name Brunello evolved into the designation of the wine produced with 100% Sangiovese.

Petrolo, Val d'Arno di Sopra Galatrona Gran Cru Merlot, Tuscany, Italy

100% Merlot. Galatrona is Petrolo's most acclaimed wine, a Merlot cru made exclusively with grapes from the Galatrona-Feriale vineyard. Poggio Antico Brunello di Montalcino Altero Tuscany

The palate is crisp and linear, refreshing citrus-like acidity with fine but creamy tannins that are long and caressing, The 2016 is layered and complex within its transparency. There is a lot to love with this wine for those who enjoy traditional Sangiovese with brightness and lift.

Abruzzo is home to one DOCG – Montepulciano d'Abruzzo Colline Teramane – and three DOC wine designations. The red and Cerasuolo d'Abruzzo and Montepulciano d'Abruzzo, and the white wine appellation Trebbiano d'Abruzzo are the most notable, followed by the lesser-known Controguerra.



Avignonesi, Vino Nobile di Montepulciano Tuscany Italy

Green apple and citrus flavors are joined by cantaloupe and honeydew melon, a richer streak of apricot, and a touch of smoky wood on the finish, with some white grapefruit, rosewater, and white flower highlights.

Italy: Tuscany

Vino Nobile de Montepulciano: The Vino Nobile di

Montepulciano received its DOCG status shortly after Brunello di Montalcino, in 1980. The DOCG covers the red wine of the Montepulciano area. The wine received its name in the 17th century, when it was the favorite wine of the Tuscan nobility. Located in the southeastern region of Tuscany, the climate of the region is strongly influenced by the sea. The variety of Sangiovese in Montepulciano is known as Prugnolo Gentile and is required to account for at least 80% of the wine. Traditionally Canaiolo and Mammolo make up the remaining part of the blend but some producers have begun to experiment with Cabernet Sauvignon and Merlot. The wines are required



to age two years prior to release, with an additional year if it is to be a riserva. The recent use of French oak barrels has increased the body and intensity of the wines which are noted for their plummy fruit, almond notes and smooth tannins.

Avignonesi, Vino Nobile di Montepulciano Tuscany Italy

It is savory and loaded with finesse, delivering juicy black cherry, ripe blackberry, truffle, and cocoa before a star anise finish. Supple tannins and bright acidity provide seamless support and balance.

Morellino di Scansano DOCG is an Italian red wine made in the hilly environs of the village of Scansano, GR, in the Maremma region of coastal Tuscany, which has an ancient but obscure tradition of winemaking. Morellino is the local name for the Sangiovese grape variety. Many people think that the name Morellino comes from morello (brown), the colour of the region's horses. The name may also come from the morello cherry, a dark red cherry with great tartness and acidity. The wine, which was



granted DOC status in 1978, then upgraded to DOCG status beginning with the 2007 vintage, is made from at least 85% Sangiovese, which is also the basis of the Tuscan wines Chianti, Brunello di Montalcino, and Vino Nobile di Montepulciano. The remaining 15% can comprise any non-aromatic black grape varieties included in a list made and periodically updated by Tuscan wine authorities.

Fattoria Le Pupille Poggio Valente (Tuscany, Italy)

100% Sangiovese Full bodied, with significant but dusty tannins, bright cherry, slightly toasted oak, tobacco and spices. This feels and tastes like a fine Brunello. Decant and enjoy.

Italy: Veneto

Veneto Wine Region: Veneto is slightly smaller than Italy's other main wine-producing regions — Piedmont, Tuscany, Lombardy, Puglia and Sicily — yet it generates more wine than any of them. Although the southern regions Sicily and Puglia were for a long time Italy's main wine producers, this balance began to shift north towards Veneto in the latter half of the 20th Century. In the 1990s, southern Italian wine weakened in an increasingly competitive and demanding world, while Veneto upped its game, gaining recognition with such wines as Valpolicella, Amarone, Soave and Prosecco.

Conegliano Valdobbiadene Prosecco: A DOCG title given to a prestigious zone for Prosecco wines made from the Glera grape variety in the Veneto wine region of northeastern Italy. The appellation was created in 1969 and promoted to DOCG 40 years later. Some retailers and other sources describe the wine as Prosecco di Conegliano Valdobbiadene. This naming convention has been superseded on labels. The zone is located near the center of the Treviso province. The catchment area spans approximately 25 kilometers (16 miles) running from east to west, just north of Montello and Colli Asolani. Vineyard yields are capped at 13.5 tons per hectare.

Lison-Pramaggiore is a DOC of the Veneto wine region in northeastern Italy. It covers a wide range of styles including red and white still varietal wines, multivariety blends, spumante and dessert wines. A Rosso blend must contain 50 percent or more of Merlot. Up to half may be Cabernet Franc, Cabernet Sauvignon, Carmenère, Malbec and/or Refosco dal Pedunculo Rossso. All of these red varieties may be made into varietal wines. The two Cabernets may only feature individually on labels from the Pordenone subzone. This province lies across the border in Friuli-Venezia Giulia.

Prosecco di Treviso Doc Treviso is a city in Veneto, and capital of the eponymous province, situated between the Gulf of Venice and the Alps. Treviso is famous as the origin of the sparkling wines known as Prosecco, and still considered among the best sources for wine made from the grape variety Glera, formerly known as Prosecco, especially from the Prosecco de Conegliano Valdobbiadene DOCG and Colli Asolani Prosecco DOCG appellations, which are independent of the standard Prosecco DOC. Prosecco wines produced according to DOC regulations within Treviso are labeled Prosecco di Treviso.

Amarone della Valpolicella: usually known as Amarone (UK: /ˌœməˈroʊneI, ni/, Italian: [amaˈroːne]), is an Italian DOCG denomination of typically rich dry red wine made from the partially dried grapes of the Corvina (45–95%, of which up to 50% could be substituted with Corvinone), Rondinella (5–30%) and other approved red grape varieties (up to 25%). Valpolicella is in the province of Verona, within the large Veneto region near Venice. In Italian, the name Amarone literally means "the



Great Bitter"; originally, this was to distinguish it from the Recioto produced in the same region, which is sweeter in taste. There are three important subregions: Amarone Della Valpolicella Classico, Amarone Della Valpolicella and Amarone Della Valpolicella Valpantena.

The official catchment area for Soave wine production covers the communes of Monteforte d'Alpone, San Martino Buon Albergo, Mezzane di Sotto, Ronca, Montecchia di Crosara, San Giovanni Ilarione, San Bonifacio, Cazzano di Tramigna, Colognola ai Colli, Caldiero, Illasi, Lavagno and



Soave itself. The production area was significantly expanded when the Soave DOC laws were drawn up, and it now covers about three times its former area.

New Zealand

New Zealand's wine regions extend 1,100km (700 miles) from subtropical Northland (35° S) down to Central Otago (45° S), home to the world's most southerly vineyards. Our vineyards benefit from the moderating effect of our maritime climate (no vineyard is more than 120km, or 80 miles, from the ocean), long sunshine hours and nights cooled by sea breezes. Most of our wine regions are found on the eastern coastlines of the North and South Islands, in the rain shadow of the mountains, each with its own unique soils and climatic conditions. Within these diverse regions, subregional characteristics shine through and wines are distinguished as being not just from a wine region, but from a subregion and a place.



Marlborough AVA: Marlborough put New Zealand on the international wine stage with its exquisite Sauvignon Blanc in the 1980s. Over 20,000ha of vines (around 2/3 of the national total) are under the care of local wine producers, making it the country's largest wine region. Marlborough wineries offer a huge range of varieties, from exquisite Pinot Noir to intense Chardonnay, and vivacious aromatics. The diverse soils and meso-climates are revealing exciting new subregions, and it is within these unique sub-regions that Marlborough's future lies.

New Zealand

Canterbury AVA: The Canterbury Geographical Indication covers wine made anywhere within the Canterbury region of New Zealand, a very large area of some 44,500 square kilometers (17,200 sq mi). In practice, almost all the region's vineyards are concentrated in a relatively small area around the city of Christchurch, which has prompted the establishment of two more specific GIs within it. North Canterbury is simply the top half of the larger Canterbury GI north of the Rakaia River, and Waipara Valley, a small area about 60 kilometers (37 mi) north of Christchurch which accounts for the majority of Canterbury's total vineyard plantings.



Waipara Valley: a Geographical Indication and sub-region of the larger Canterbury GI, about 60 kilometres (37 mi) north of Christchurch. The valley floor provides a warm micro-climate ideal for viticulture. To the west, the Southern Alps temper the prevailing westerly winds and provide a rain shadow, and to the east, low coastal limestone ridges moderate the cool ocean winds. The region makes up the bulk of Canterbury's plantings, which by 2017 was a total vineyard area of 1,257 hectares (3,110 acres), well known for its Pinot Noir, of which 340 hectares (840 acres) is planted. Liam Steevenson MW has described Waipara as possibly the "most ex-



citing place to grow Pinot Noir". White wines of the region include varietal wines, most commonly of Sauvignon Blanc, Riesling, Pinot Gris, and Chardonnay.

Rubus Sauvignon Blanc, Waipara Valley, Canterbury, New Zealand

Oregon

Willamette Valley AVA is 150 miles long and up to 60 miles wide making it Oregon's largest AVA. It runs from the Columbia River in Portland south through Salem to the Calapooya Mountains outside Eugene. The Willamette Valley is relatively mild throughout the year, with cool, wet winters and warm, dry summers. While moisture is abundant, most of the rainfall occurs in the winter, not during growing season. This temperate climate, combined with coastal marine influences, make the gentle growing conditions within the Valley ideal for cool



climate grapes, including Pinot noir. The Valley enjoys more daylight hours during the growing season than in any other area of the state. During this longer growing season, the Willamette Valley enjoys warm days and cool nights, a diurnal temperature swing that allows the wine grapes to develop their flavor and complexity while retaining their natural acidity. Named for the river that flows through it, the Willamette Valley has the largest concentration of wineries and vineyards in Oregon and includes seven appellations within its borders: Chehalem Mountains, Dundee Hills, Eola-Amity Hills, McMinnville, Ribbon Ridge, Van Duzer Corridor and Yamhill-Carlton.

Portugal

Portugal has a number of native grape varieties – such as Touriga Nacional, Tinta Barroca, Touriga Francesa, Tinta Cao, and Tinta Roriz – making a variety of different styles. These wines are often a mystery to the international shopper because they are produced to be sold locally, with very few being exported to other countries. Portugal's most globally recognized and celebrated vino is of course Port, closely followed by Madeira, making Portugal a force to be reckoned with when it comes to fortified wines. From Vinho Verde in the north west of Portugal to the Alentejo region in the south east, there are a vast number of wine growing regions available to Portuguese winemakers to create some truly outstanding wines. The



Douro wine region (where the majority of Port is produced) has been the most important winemaking region in Portugal for centuries, but with further exploration into still wine production, other regions may be set to challenge it's authority over the coming years. Similar to Bourgogne in France, there are a large number of AVAs and sub-AVAs.

Porto / Douro: The Porto & Douro regions are two of the most famous wine-producing regions in Portugal. Forming a part of the world-renowned Douro Valley, Porto has played a big role in the production of excellent Port wines. Since the start of the wine industry in this region, the land following the course of the Douro River has been worked by hand and shaped into terraces, which creates spectacular landscapes. The valley of the Douro River provides a natural amphitheater in which endless rows of vines are planted. The landscape leaves all who see it completely enraptured by its deep valleys and gorges, clean and crisp air, terraced vineyards, and the clear blue waters of the Douro River.

Luscious berry fruit flavors linger into the long finish.

Romania

Romania is one of the world's largest wine producers and fifth-largest among European wine-producing countries, after Italy, France, Spain, and Germany. In recent years, Romania has attracted many European business people and wine buyers, due to the affordable prices of both vineyards and wines compared to other wine-producing nations such as France, Germany,



and Italy.Romania's most cultivated grape varieties are for white wines Fetească Albă, Fetească Regală, Riesling, Aligoté, Sauvignon, Muscat, Pinot Gris, Chardonnay, Tămâioasă Românească, Grasă de Cotnari, Galbenă de Odobești. Also, the main grape varieties for red wines are Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon, Băbească Neagră, Fetească Neagră, and Pinot Noir.Romania has eight wine regions: Transylvania Highlands, Moldavian Hill, Muntenia Hills, Oltenia Hills, Banat Hills, Dobrogea Hills, Crișana Maramureș Hills, and The Danube Terrace

Transylvania Highlands: The esteemed sub-region of Romania has an array of wines known throughout the world for their eminence and distinction. Romania's quintessential style is set apart from the rest due to its soil types, the selection of grape varieties grown, and the specific production methods of winemakers in the area. These elements produce a style of wine found nowhere else in Transylvania Highlands., or the world for that matter.



Royal Maiden of Transylvania Fetească Regală, Dealu Mare, Romania

Slovenia

Slovenia has three key wine regions: Podravje in the east, Primorska in the west and Posavje just south of the center. Podravje is the engine room of Slovenian wine industry, producing roughly half of the country's national output.



Littoral Region ~ Primorska is a coastal region, just across the Adriatic from Venice and Fruili. Since 1991, it has shown the greatest increase in quality wine production of all the regions, and continues to demonstrate its vinous potential in national and international wine competitions. Sharing many of the same mineral-rich soils and mesoclimates as neighboring Friuli-Venezia, the region is well-suited to viticulture. The Littoral Wine-Growing Region (Primorska vinorodna dežela) has two of Slovenia's most widely known and prominent wine districts, the Gorizia Hills (Goriška brda) and Koper districts. It is subdivided into four districts. The Brda district borders the Italian wine region of Friuli-Venezia Giulia with the Gorizia Hills Denominazione di origine controllata (DOC). This region was one of the first in Slovenia to



make a concentrated attempt at establishing an international reputation for quality. The area is planted with international varieties of Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon, Chardonnay, Sauvignon blanc, Pinot gris (Sivi Pinot), and Pinot noir (Modri Pinot) as well as Ribolla Gialla (Rebula), Refosco (Refošk) and Friulano. Brda is best known for its Rebula white wine and Merlot-Cabernet blends. [1]

Edi Simčič Duet, Goriska Brda, Primorska, Slovenia

(80% Merlot, 10% Cabernet Franc, 10% Cabernet Sauvignon) Pronounced nose of black fruit, blackberries, black cherries, jam, plum, black pepper, animalic, leather. The palate is reminiscent of blackberries, red cherries and a little of pepper. A wine of medium body and a more complex character than other robust reds from the Goriška Brda region holding a soft texture and nice length.

Edi Simčič Rebula, Goriska Brda, Primorska, Slovenia

(100% Ribolla Gialla) Virtually unkown in the U.S., the Rebula varietal (aka Ribolla Gialla) is a classic white grape from Goriška Brda. Bottle aging can lead to remarkable layers of citrus and pome fruits. In classic Edi Simcic style, this layered and complex wine spends 10 months fermenting in oak and has a pleasing, oily palate-weight. Driven by its fascinating terroir, it speaks to both its subalpine origins and the estate's proximity to the sea. The nose is matured and youthful at the same time providing dried apples, roasted notes, lemon, balsamic and honeycomb. It has a firm, full mouthfeel with a longer aftertaste. It wins us over with distinct acidity, saltiness, and a mineral note, which cleans the mouth.

South Africa

The wine regions of South Africa were defined under the "Wine of Origin" (Wyn van Oorsprong) act of 1973. Mirroring the French Appellation d'origine contrôlée (AOC) system, all South African wines listing a "Wine of Origin" must be composed entirely of grapes from its region. The "Wine of Origins (WO) program mandates how wine regions of South Africa are defined and can appear on wine labels. While some aspects of the WO are taken from the AOC, the WO is primarily concerned with accuracy in labeling. As a result, the WO does not place adjunct regulations on wine regions such as delineating permitted varie-



ties, trellising methods, irrigation techniques, and crop yields. The WO system divides growing regions into four categories. The largest and most generic are Geographical Units (such as the Western Cape region) which subsume the smaller, but still broad spanning Regions (such as Cape South Coast). Under these are clustered districts (like Walker Bay) and within them are wards (such as Elgin). Although these are geographic units, regions and districts are largely traced by political boundaries (wards are the segment most defined by unique, Terroir characteristics).

Western Cape is a Geographical Unit within the Wine of Origin classification system of South African wine. Corresponding to the province of Western Cape it includes most of the vineyards in South Africa. The wines of the Western Cape range from sturdy Rhone-style red wines to aromatic Sauvignon blancs in vineyards cooled by breezes off the Atlantic.

This vibrant Chenin showcases yellow fruit, honeysuckle and spice which are supported by an underlying minerality. Made from 40 year old vines. Aged in a combination of stainless and large oak barrels. Pale in color with some green hues. Lemon, green apple, melon nose. Medium plus acidity, cool clean body. Has some Loire Valley influence. Melon and lime body. Lots of extract.

Babylonstoren Viognier Western Cape, South Africa

Light, yellowish tint. Showcases layers of fresh peaches with dried apricot and blossom aromas. The wood contributes to depth, although not strongly noticeable. The mouthfeel is round and creamy from the 30% well integrated French oak (seven months). A floral nose and lime zest finish complete the perfect balance.

Spain

There are 69 officially recognized wine regions in Spain. The mainstream areas are referred to as Denominaciones de Origen D.O, which are like France's appellations, and the wine produced here is carefully regulated for quality according to specific laws. With extremely varying climates, terroir and wine making traditions throughout the country, every wine region has something different to offer – from the warm red wines of Rioja to the sparkling Cava from Penedes.



Alella DOC. Purchasing wines from Alella is difficult internationally—nearly all of the wines are consumed locally in Catalunya. Alella, located just north of Barcelona on the Mediterranean coast, is one of Spains smallest wine producing regions. Despite a rich wine producing history stretching all the way back to the Roman empire and with local wines served to the medieval kings of Aragon.



Marfil Brut Cava, Alella Vinicola Barcelona, Spain (Macabeu, Parellada, Xarel·lo)
This cava, a blend of white grapes xarel-lo, macabeo and parellada, is deceptively delicious.
Reveals flavors of red currants and citrus before gliding into a long finish

Ribera del Duero is a Spanish Denominación de Origen Protegida (DOP) located in the country's northern plateau and is one of eleven 'quality wine' regions within the autonomous community of Castile and León. It is also one of several recognised wine-producing regions to be found along the course of the Duero river. The region is characterised by a largely flat, rocky terrain and is centered on the town of Aranda de Duero.



Bodegas Balbas, Ribera del Duero Tempranillo 5 Barrica Balbás Barrica is a contemporary 14/40 red wine that fully demonstrates the versatility of Tempranillo to reach new horizons beyond its evident freshness and fragrant, exuberant aromatic potential. A reddish color with a marked violet rim, fruity notes appear over a light vanilla background. The mid-palate is wonderfully balanced, confirming that the character of the Tempranillo grape can achieve unimagined heights with the application of scrupulous vinification techniques and careful ageing in oak.

Aragon Located in the northeast of Spain, Aragon extends from the Pyrenees Mountains all the way south to the central Iberian Peninsula. To the east of Aragon is the wine region Catalonia, and to the west, the wine regions of La Rioja, Castillay Leon and Navarra.



Campo de Borja is a Spanish Denominación de Origen Protegida (DOP) for wines located in the Campo de Borja comarca, northwest of the province of Zaragoza (Aragon, Spain). It is a transition zone between the plains of the River Ebro and the mountains of the Sistema Ibérico. The Moncayo mountain is the dominant feature of the DOP and creates a microclimate which gives the wines a special character.



Bodegas Alto Moncayo, Campo De Borja Garnacha Aragón, Spain

100% Garnacha. Red-violet to the eye, this wine features aromas of blackberry, Luxardo cherry, black fruit, balsamic notes, toasted touches and violet. It is smooth on the palate, meaty and powerful with glossy tannins and flavors of blackberry, black cherry, elderberry, menthol, and dark chocolate. There is a note of butterscotch on the finish which is lingering and persistent.

Spain

Rioja (La Rioja) Wine Region. Without doubt, Rioja is Spain's most famous wine growing region. People have been growing wine grapes there since the 2nd century BC. The wines are based on the Tempranillo grape variety, but are usually blended with Garnacha, Graciano, and Mazuelo (along with a few others). Rioja is divided into three distinct growing regions: Rioja Alta is the coolest of the three and makes the finest wines, Rioja Alavesa is just southeast of Alta and makes wines of high tannin and structure, and Rioja Baja, the warmest of the three, which makes simple, everyday drinking wines.



CVNE Monopole Clasico Viura from Rioja, Spain

Aged in Sherry casks of 300 to 500 liters and blended with 5% Manzanilla de Sanlúcar (produced with Palomino grapes). On the nose, it's a complex wine with notes of pear, apple, white currant, white flowers, dried fruits, and spice. On the palate, there is salinity and an elegant acidity which provide freshness. Yeasty, saline and refreshing, with lots of acidity and barely a hint of wood. Monopole is always a classic!

CVNE Rioja Reserva Tempranillo Rioja, Spain

The first wine made by family-owned CVNE (founded in 1879). This Reserva is 85% Tempranillo, with 15% Garnacha Tinta, Graciano and Mazuelo, aged for 18 months in French and American oak. There's a savoury edge to the attractive black and red fruit aromas, plus sweet spice from the oak. The layered palate has a silky black fruit attack, spice, and leather notes, with medium tannins. Nicely judged oak.

La Rioja Alta Vina Arana Reserva Tempranillo Rioja, Spain

Lovely, deep cherry red, with a marked pink rim. The nose stands out for its aromatic intensity, with notes of ripe dark fruit leading to an elegant range of balsamic notes, tobacco leaves, caramel, vanilla and chocolate. This new Viña Arana stands out in the mouth for its freshness and balanced acidity. Soft tannins and a pleasant structure provide an elegantly mouthfeel. Over time, the bottle will endow it with an elegant, complex bouquet.

Bodegas Izadi, Rioja Blanco

A classic blend of indigenous varieties Viura, Malvasía, Garnacha Blanca, Tempranillo Blanco, Maturana Blanca and Turruntés, the Rioja Blanco from Izadi comes from 50–60-year-old bush vines planted on chalky soils in Rioja Alavesa. Very attractive dried-apple and lemon aromas with some stone and honeysuckle character. It's medium-bodied with firmness and freshness. Stone and chalk undertones. Flavorful finish.

Penedès Wine Region is a wine-producing region within Catalonia having a Spanish Denominación de Origen Protegida (DOP) (Denominació d'Origen Protegida in Catalan). Penedès DOP includes all Penedès region and municipalities of four other comarques: Anoia, Alt Camp, Baix Llobregat and Tarragonès. The area is framed by the coastal hills of the Serra del Garraf and the higher inland mountains which skirt the Catalan Central Depression. Long considered one of the country's best wine-producing regions after the Rioja, it is also one of the most ancient viticultural areas in Europe.



Freixenet Ice Cuvée Especial (demi-sec) Cava N.V. (100% Macabeo) Fine bubbles combined with a nose of peaches, ripe pears, flowers, and nuances of tropical fruits. The palate is creamy yet sweet with a long finish.

Juvé & Camps, Cava Brut Nature Reserva De La Familia Pale gold in color, this Cava has aromas of mature white peach, toasted bread and green tea with hints of lemon citrus and apricots. Reserva de la Familia is the flagship cuvée of the Juvé y Camps estate winery. Made from the free run juice of traditional varieties Macabeo, Xarel.lo and Parellada and a touch of Chardonnay, this is the Cava of choice of Spain's royal family, and it is regularly served at all official banquets.

Spain

Toro is a wine region in Castilla y Leon, north-western Spain. It is becoming increasingly well known for its powerful, full bodied red wines made from Tina da Toro (Tempranillo). Very small amounts of white wine are also made.

The Catalunya wine region has different sub-regions dividing the main area and those are also appellations, namely: Costers del Segre, Emporda, Cava, Penedes, Pla de Bages, Alella, Conca de Barbera, Tarragona, Montsant, and Terra Alta as DOs and Priorat, as DOCa. The region itself is also an appellation (Catalunya DO).

Vina Tridado Enlightenment Garnacha Blanca Catalunya, Spain 2020

The region of Catalunya on the northeastern coast of Spain is home to some of the most sought-after wines in the country. Its location near the ocean lends especially particularly well to white and sparkling wines, providing plenty of sunshine as well as consistent, cooling breezes. 'Enlightenment' is a prime example of this - crisp acidity with flavors of tangerine, grapefruit and a subtle salinity that only comes from coastal terroir.

Vina Tridato Harmonic Garnacha Rose D.O. Catalunya, Spain 2020

Hailing from the hills of Catalonia, Harmonic Rose is 100% Garnacha and really showcases the fruit quality of that grape. Garnacha is a perfect varietal for making rose due to its spiciness and natural acidity, which is key for having complex and great tasting rose. The Harmonic rose has plenty of red berry fruits and some delicious watermelon and mango.

La Figuera Sub Region, Montsant DOP almost completely surrounds the more famous Priorat (DOQ). The vineyards extend along the mountainsides among olive groves, forests and rocky outcrops. The denomination covers the area of Priorat comarca that is not part of DOQ Priorat as well as part of the neighboring comarca of Ribera d'Ebre.

Com Tu Grenache Clos Mogador 2017

100% <u>Grenache</u> from <u>Montsant, Spain</u>. Coming from 35- to 50-year-old Garnacha vines, the 2017 Com Tu offers a pretty strawberry and red currant-scented nose as well as plenty of peppery spice and flowery incense nuances. With medium-bodied richness, ripe, polished tannins, and terrific overall balance, this charming, undeniably delicious Monstant is well worth drinking and following over the coming 7-8 years.

Priorat is a Denominació d'Origen Qualificada (DOQ) for Catalan wines produced in the Priorat county, in the province of Tarragona, in the southwest of Catalonia. It primarily produces powerful red wines. The area is characterised by its unique terroir of black slate and quartz soil known as llicorella. It is one of only two wine regions in Spain to qualify as DOCa, the highest qualification level for a wine region according to Spanish wine regulations, alongside Rioja DOCa.



Bodegas Vina Tridado, Priorat Soliterra Heredad Edicio Limitada

60% Carinyena, 10% Garnatxa, 21.83% Cabernet, 5.70% Syrah & 2.47% Merlot. Soliterra is a wine with a great personality. This is a wine marked by potent aromas, a pleasant sensation of tannins and by a finish rich in nuances. Garnet in color, its aroma reminds of carob, ripe black fruits, and chocolate, with touches of licorice. On the palate it is round, structured, with flavors of black fruits and vanilla. It is easy to drink and smooth and silky in the mouth. This beautiful wine can cellar through 2035.

Switzerland

Switzerland: may not be the most famous of wine-producing nations, but this small, mountainous country in western Europe has been making wine for more than two thousand years. Swiss wine's lack of fame is not due to any lack of quality or quantity, but because it is produced mostly for (and consumed happily by) the Swiss themselves. Six wine regions are defined by Swiss Wine Promotion, an association that represents Swiss winemakers. They are: Geneva, German-speaking Switzerland, Three Lakes (including Neuchatel, Fribourg, and part of the canton of Bern), Ticino, Vaud, and Valais. The nation's favorite grape varieties — Chasselas (often labeled "Fendant" in



numerous cantons throughout the country), Pinot Noir, Gamay and Merlot – are all of French origin.

Valais: is the largest wine region and appellation in Switzerland, responsible for around one third of the country's total wine production. The main vineyard area covers the southeast-facing slopes of the dramatic Rhône river valley as the glacial waters run southwest between Leuk (Loeche in French) and Fully.



Provins, Fendant L'Alpage (Chasselas) Valais

Fendant is the Valais' name for Chasselas, Switzerland's premier white-wine variety, and for those of you who've tasted Chasselas before, you know two things: (a) it makes beautifully textured, terroir-expressive wine, and (b) it is usually prohibitively expensive. Valais is a beautiful white that delivers richness, minerality, and a great sense of elegance. Caramelized citrus, lemon blossom, crushed rocks, and white flower notes dominate the bouquet, and it hits the palate with medium body, flawless balance, building richness, and a great finish.

Turkey

Turkey is geographically located on the wine belt thanks to its suitable climatic conditions and soil character. Turkey is part of the **Caucasus region**, considered to be the birthplace of wine, with signs of production and grape domestication as far back as 8000 BC to 4000 BC. he vineyards in Turkey cover an area of 1,000,000 ha (2,500,000 acres). Annual grape harvest in Turkey accounts for 3.6 million tonnes putting it on the 6th place in the world. However, only 2% of that amount is suitable for wine production. Wine production was neglected in Turkey primarily on the grounds of religion. Major wine regions are Aegean, Marmara and Central Anatolia.

Mid-Northern Anatolia: The Mid-Northern Anatolia wine region is located right in the centre of Turkey and includes two wine areas: Usak province in the west and Ankara province in the northeast of Turkey. The region has a continental climate with hot dry summers and cold winters. Soil: Pebbly clay loam. Wine production share in Turkey: 3,3% Grape varieties: Bogazkere, Emir, Hasandede, Kalecik Karasi, Okuzgozu, Papazkarasi and Syrah.



Kavaklidere Prestige Kalecik Karasi Ankara Central Anatolia Region Turkey

<u>Kalecik Karasi</u>, <u>Other Red</u>. Dark cherry to the eye, this wine has aromas of blackberry, vanilla, and violet. It feels good in the mouth, with silky tannins and flavors of cassis, black plum, crème brûlée and herbes de Provence. The smooth finish is marked with a note of orange zest.

Kavaklidere Selection Narince-Emir Cappadocia Central Anatolia Region Turkey

Narince-Emir, <u>Other White</u>. Aromas of grapefruit and lemon zest lead to flavors of pink grapefruit, toasted pine-apple and honeysuckle. It brightens the mouth from first sip to the zesty finish.

Mid-Eastern Anatolia wine region includes the wine areas of Tokat Province in the north, Elazığ Province and Malatya Province in the east. The climate of Tokat area shows a transition between the Central Black Sea and the Central Anatolia climates while the climate of Elazığ and Malatya is typical terrestrial.

Selection Red, which combines the aroma and elegance of Öküzgözü, one of the most elegant grapes of Anatolia, with the strong and bodied structure of the Bosphorus, is a unique cup in the Eastern Anatolia Region. The Selection series, which started production in 1987 in honor of the 60th anniversary of Kavaklıdere Wines, is the rising value of Anatolian wine production. Full-bodied, complex, strong, and mature tannins and a bottle of aging potency for many years.

Uruguay

Uruguay may be small compared to its Goliath neighbors (Argentina and Brazil), but for what it lacks in size it makes up for in diversity. Uruguay has no less than 99 classified soil types and has wine regions that range from rocky coastal hills to humid pampa. Canelones & Montevideo, Maldonado, Lavalleja, Atlántida, Rocha, San José, Colonia, Durazno, Rivera Paysandú.

Maldonado: Maldonado is an emerging wine region in the southeast of Uruguay, on the Atlantic Ocean, producing an array of red and white wines. As elsewhere in the country, the Tannat grape variety is most common. Other key red varieties are Merlot, Malbec and the Cabernets (Sauvignon and Franc). The wines are classified either as Vino de Calidad Preferente (VCP) or as Vino común (VC). VCP wines are of high quality and are made using only cultivated grape varietals. VC wines are table wines that are sold in demijohn bottles or tetra packs. Maldonado Pinot Noir is used to create excellent Uruguayan champagne. The grapes are lightly squeezed to avoid colour tainting the colour of the wine and the juice undergoes a slow process of fermentation until it becomes champagne.



Bodega Garzón, Cabernet Franc Reserva Maldonado Uruguay

100% Cabernet Franc A deep purple color with violet reflections, this noble red wine begins with a pleasing aroma of blackberry, plum, earth, a little graphite and just a hint of a minty herbal note accompanied by a subtle chocolate note and smoke from selected barrels. Tasting the wine reveals ripe fruit and no green pepper (pyrazine) notes so often found in Cabernet Franc. This easy to drink wine is full of flavorful fruit with touches of herbs and spice. Add in a smooth mouthfeel and soft tannins and this is a nice little Cab Franc! It ends dry and quite long with a slightly grippy finish.

Washington State: Columbia Valley

Walla Walla Valley: Consider the special range of soils carpeting the Valley. The variations are nearly infinite, but we refer to four major categories. At the lowest elevations are cobblestone river gravels. These are fields literally covered with dark basalt stones, and they soak up the warmth of the sun before releasing it back at the vines after twilight. These soils are very well-drained (which is great for wine quality), and they are rich in iron, calcium, magnesium and other minerals that fuel remarkable flavors. The next category is known as loess (pronounced "luss") layered over flood sediments. Loess is fine, wind-blown silt; and it measures two to four feet deep here in areas below 1,100 feet in elevation. Beneath the loess are coarser layers of sand and gravel deposited by cata-



strophic, glacial floods that swept through this region about 15,000 years ago. The uplands above 1,100 feet in elevation are home to the soil category called deep silts. As with the previous soil type, this silt is fine, wind-blown loess. But in these higher locations the powdery soil measures more than eight or 10 feet thick! The final soil category is very thin silt sprinkled over weathered basalt. It's found on steep, southwest-facing hillsides, and it consists of just a few inches of very fine, wind-blown soil over the ancient volcanic bedrock that supports our entire region.

Seven Hills Winery, Merlot

This wine presents all the classic attributes we look for in Washington Merlot: lush and ripe fruit, a balanced and succulent palate, and a friendly accessibility. We also blend in a small amount of Cabernet Franc to accentuate the floral notes and bring an intriguing undertone of tobacco and brown leaf. This wine is soft, with a berry palate of strawberry, black plum and spice with a juicy, firm finish.

K Vintners King Coal Red Blend Columbia Valley, Washington State

185

I was blown away by the 2017 King Coal, which comes all from the Stoneridge Vineyard on the Royal Slope and is 80% Cabernet Sauvignon and 20% Syrah. The Syrah is not destemmed, and everything is co-fermented in oak uprights and aged in 60% new barrels. Brilliant on all accounts, with a huge nose of spiced red and black fruits, chocolate, cured meats, tobacco, and truffle, it hits the palate with full-bodied richness, awesome tannins, a great mid-palate, and a finish that won't quit. The Syrah component gives this plenty of upfront appeal, yet it's going to cruise in cold cellars for 15 years or more.

Yakima Valley: Part of the larger Columbia Valley AVA, Yakima Valley AVA is home to more than 18,000 acres (73 km²) of vineyards, giving the area the largest concentration of wineries and vineyards in the state. The most widely planted varietals in the area are Chardonnay, Riesling, Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon, Pinot gris, and Syrah. [4] Nearly 40% of Washington state yearly wine production is made from Yakima Valley grapes.



L'Ecole No 41, Chenin Blanc Old Vines Columbia Valley Washington

A standout Chenin Blanc! With pronounced aromatics which range from citrus peel to fresh stone fruit, laced with white floral flourishes, it is vibrant and energetic. In the mouth, flavors burst forward with tropical kiwi and guava, completed by a snappy quince note. An exceedingly interesting and tasty wine, its complexity persists to a vibrant finish.

Lebanon

The latitudes of the Lebanon on the eastern Mediterranean coast may seem too low for high-quality wine production, but the Bekaa Valley on an inland plateau as high as England's tallest mountains eases the temperatures considerably and can yield some very exciting red wines. Chateau Musar is the label best known outside the Lebanon and its bordeaux-like structure (filled out with much headier Cabernet Sauvignon and Cinsaut fruit than the Médoc is ever likely to produce) was inspired by a visit to the Bartons of St-Julien.



Bekaa Valley wine region of Lebanon is considered the home of the country's modern winemaking industry. It is one of the oldest winemaking regions in the world and today produces more than 90% of all of the wine made in Lebanon. Throughout the history of the valley, winemaking has played a predominant role in its growth and development. Today, the majority of grapes grown in the valley are of French origins. Most of the vineyards in the region work the vines completely by hand and then use a mix of traditional and modern methods in wine production. The result of this is a portfolio of some of the best wines in Lebanon.



Château Musar, Blanc, Bekaa Valley, Lebanon

A gorgeous white blend from Lebanon! Château Musar Blanc is a barrel-aged white wine made from the Obaideh (related to Chardonnay) and Merwah (related to Semillon) native varieties that are grown in the Bekaa Valley (Lebanon) by Château Musar. Château Musar Blanc comes from two ancient native varieties that grow in the Bekaa Valley. The Obaideh variety grows at the foot of the hill on rocky and calcareous soils and the Merwah is planted on the hill on calcareous gravel soils at an altitude of 1,400 metres. They are cultivated using traditional agriculture and the harvest is low-yield but high-quality. Château Musar Blanc is a Lebanese style wine and one of the best in the world. An intense and complex white that is perfect for people who love mature wines with good bottle aging.

Massaya, Gold Reserve Bekaa Valley, Lebanon

83

The 2011 Gold Reserve is a 50/40 blend of Cabernet Sauvignon and Mourvèdre, plus 10% Syrah. All of the grapes were sourced from Haddath Baalbeck vineyard, at 950 meters. It was aged for 16 months in an equal mixture of new and used French oak and comes in at 14.5% alcohol. It seems pretty brilliant now, perhaps the best wine I've ever seen from Massaya. It opens with some velvet. The oak certainly affects the texture. Then the wine becomes intense and largely pulls in the wood with a half hour in the glass. It shows some hints of beef and game on the gripping finish. The Syrah and the Mourvèdre add welcome complexity on the nose and palate. It's focused and powerful, with a lot of tannic pop. This is beautiful—and very young. This is built for the long haul. It is certainly still on the upswing.

Armenia

The region of Vayots Dzor claims to be home to the oldest winery in the world, in operation some 6,100 years ago. Discovered in 2007, the Areni-1 cave complex held evidence of large-scale wine production and the likely domestication of vines. Some think wine consumption reaches back even further. Patrick McGovern, scientific director of biomolecular archaeology project for cuisine, fermented beverages and health at the University of Pennsylvania Museum, found traces of wine on an 8,000-year-old Stone Age shard of pottery retrieved on a modern-day Georgian site. There are 4 main wine regions in Armenia: Ararat, Armavir, Aragatsotn, and Vayots Dzor. Around 85 and 90% of all the wine from Armenia comes



from these superb wine regions. The best known is Vayots Dzor, which is home to the Areni wine.

Vayots Dzor is a mountainous province in southeastern Armenia. It is one of the oldest documented wine producing regions in the world, and the motherland of Areni Noir (Sev Areni), the country's main indigenous red variety. Other key varieties are Khatoun Kharji, Tozot and Voskehat. Vayots Dzor contains the most wineries of any province, many of which lie in the famous Areni Valley. Key villages there include not only Areni itself, but also Yeghegnadzor and Aghavnadzor, as well as Vayk a little further southeast.



YACOUBIAN-HOBBS, Areni Rind, Vayots Dzor, Armenia,

100% Areni Internationally renowned winemaker Paul Hobbs and the Yacoubian family journey to the birthplace of Wine to craft modern, world-class wines from the indigenous varieties found in the high altitude, mineral-rich soils of Vayots Dzor, Armenia. Expressive aromas of red berries and black cherries, followed by floral notes of lilacs and hint of minerality. The palate is both intense and elegant. A ripe and powerful tannic structure and refreshing acidity bring balance to the fruit flavors, culminating in a complex yet harmonious finish.

Zulal Vayots Dzor Areni 'Reserve' Red Wine Armenia

100% Areni. The fruit for the Areni Reserve comes from Aghasafi, a small village in the Arpa River Valley. Coming from a single south-facing plot, the fruit is hand-harvested and fermented in stainless steel before spending 12 months in neutral French and Caucasian oak barrels. More dark-fruited than the Classic, the Areni Reserve has the structure of a Burgenland Blaufrankisch or Côte-Rôtie Syrah. This wine has an intense nose showing ripe red cherries and red currants on the nose with nuanced carmel and vanilla notes. The palate is pleasant with silky tannins, with a round mouthfeel and a long finish.

Zulal Vayots Dzor Areni Red Wine Armenia

100% Areni. An elegant, aromatic wine with notes of red cherries, plums, pomegranate, and chocolate set the scene for flavors of strawberry, raspberry, white chocolate, and anisette. Medium-weight tannins and a good mouthfeel.

Zulal Vayots Dzor Voskehat White Wine Armenia

100% Voskehat, an ancient white variety indigenous to Armenia. It results in fuller bodied wine with flavors of stone fruits, flowers, and delicate notes of herbs. This is a dry, medium-to-full bodied wine with aromas of ripe apple, pear and honeysuckle balanced by a crisp, savory herb backbone. Pale golden yellow in color, it has a long finish and a pleasing minerality.

India

The heat and humidity of India's wine region dictate many of the viticultural choices that are made in the vineyards. Vines are often trained on bamboo and wire in a pergola to increase canopy cover and to get the grapes off the ground where they would be more prone to fungal diseases. The canopy protects the grapes against sunburn and rows are spaced wide to help with aeration between the vines. Irrigation is essential for the vines given the hot weather. The tropical conditions often promote high yields which requires frequent pruning throughout the year. Harvest normally takes place in February and is usually done by hand. In the very warm wine regions of Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, and Andhra



Pradesh, grapevines can produce a crop twice a year. Southern India is home to several indigenous table grape varieties that can also be used in wine production with Anabeshahi, Arkavati and Arkashyam being the most common. Popular non-native grapes include the Bangalore Blue (Isabella) and Gulabi (Black Muscat). The Turkish grape Sultana is the most widely planted grape in India, cover more than half of the 148,000 acres (60,000 ha) planted in the country. In addition to the imported French varieties that Chateau Indage planted, Sauvignon blanc, Zinfandel, Chenin blanc and Clairette Blanche have started to establish a presence in the Indian wine industry There are five major wine producing regions in India including Nashik, Pune, Bangalore, Hampi Hills, Bijapur and Northern Karnataka.

Nashik is India's most prolific wine-producing area, located some 135 kilomteters (85 miles) north-east of Mumbai in the state of Maharashtra. The wine industry here has been growing steadily since the mid-1990s, and now there are around 40 vine-yards spread throughout the area. Nashik primarily makes wine from several red and white grapes. Not only is the hot conditions good for a range of red wines, but also several white wines. Like its neighbouring region of Pune, Cabernet Sauvignon and Shiraz are primarily used for the red wines, while locals use Chenin Blanc and Sauvignon Blanc for the white wines. While the days are hot, which develops high levels of sugar and concentration, the cool nights ensure balanced acidity in the grapes and wines.
